

One important saving effected by the King Government is in the interest on the public debt. the amount of this being a little over \$2,375,000 as a result of refunding loans floated by the Government in the latter half of 1924 to pay off maturing Victory Bonds and other abligations. The Government was able to get its money at a considerable cheaper rate than of the uncontrolable outlays: soldiers' land settlement, \$1,500,000; soldiers' civil re-establishment, \$1,000,000; adjustment of war claims, \$135,000; Imperial War Graves Commission, \$98,780. Included in the estimates is an item that will prove popular with the agricultural people of the country, and that is prevision for an annuity of \$5,000 for Dr. Charles Saunders of the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa for his invaluable services to his country in the development of the now famous "Marquis" spring wheat.

After an illuminating disrussion, in which the Prime Minister and Hon. Ernest Lepointe were the principal speakers for the Government, Mr. Meighan for the Opposition and Hon. T. A. 
