The scheme is probably not perfect, but I have sufficient confidence in the breadth of view of the Prime Minister, the Minister of Trade and Commerce and the rest of the Government to feel assured that if, in this committee to which the whole matter is to be referred; suggestions are made that quite evidently it will be in the interest of Parliament to accept, they will be accepted."

ATTITUDE OF PROGRESSIVES
The attitude of the Progressive party, as expressed by its leader, Robert Forke, on Friday afternoon and by Alfred Speakman on Tuesday, is that they are not hostile to the plan, but simply critical. They readily recognize the existence of a great combine that is controlling the ocean freight rates and exacting a heavy toll upon Canadian shippers and they are ready to aid any reasonable plan whereby that combine can be curbed in its operations and ocean rates reduced. They are not sure about the feasibility of the Government's scheme and are anxious to have it completely investigated by the special committee. If and when that committee substantiates the charges contained in the Preston report and in the report of the special committee of two sessions ago and it finds that the Government's plan is the only plan and that it is workable then they will throw their weight behind the Government in getting it passed by Parliament.

GETTING DOWN TO BUSINESS
A lively scene was enacted in the House Thursday afternoon when the Prime Minister hoveed that beginning next Wednesday the Government take that day for its business. The move

was made by the Government, explained Premier King, for the sole purpose of expediting the business of the House, shortening the session and thereby saving the time of Parliament and the money of the people. This was immediately objected to by Mr. Meighen who saw fast fading any possibility of a debate on his resolution made public the day before the session opened and which embodied the policy of the Conservatives in regard to the tariff and transportation and the British Preference. Also, it is to be recalled that last session the Conservatives were scolding the Progressives for needlessly prolonging the session by much talk, while this session the Conservatives have been denouncing the Progressives and the Liberals for a "conspiracy of silence" simply because the latter were generally agreed upon eliminating needless debate and saving the people's time and money. On a vote of the House on the Premier's motion it was carried 117 to 74 and a record of that vote discloses the anomaly, repeated in previous sessions of this Parliament, of the Conservatives having aligned with them the ultra-Radicals of the Progressive party, hailing from Alberta and also the two Labor members.

THE GENEVA PROTOCOL
Another interesting item of the week was the statement to the House on Thursday by the Prime Minister of the Canadian Government's attitude to the Geneva protocol. In declaring the Government's policy on this question Premier King said, "We do not consider it in the best interests of Canada, of the British Empire or of the League of Nations itself to recommend to Parliament adherence to the protocol and particularly to its rigid provisions for application of economic and military sanctions in practically every future war. Among the grounds for this conclusion is the consideration of the effect of the non-participation of the United States upon attempts to enforce the sanctions and particularly so in the case of a contiguous country like Canada."

OTTAWA, March 21st. — After seven full days of debate the legis-

lation providing for the enactment of the Federal Government's proposed agreement with Sir William Peterson to obtain control of ocean freight rates was given a second reading in the House of Commons last Friday night and is now ready to go before the special committee to be appointed next week. It was a live-debate while it lasted, five members of the King Cabinet, Mr. Meighen, the Conservative leader and Mr. Forke, the Progressive chief, making important contributions to the discussion.

Liberal opinion on the project, as expressed by the Prime Minister most forcibly, and by his colleagues, is that the existence of a combine, known as the North Atlantic Conference, which fixes ocean freight rates, has been abundantly proven. Also, that it is a serious handicap upon Canadian trade through Canadian ports, because of gross discrimination both as to the freight rates themselves and as to marine insurance rates. So serious is the injury that the time has come when drastic measures must be taken to provide a remedy. The proposed agreement with Peterson, which provides for the payment of cash to Petersen in return for the Government being given control of freight rates, the Government believes, the most practicable remedy immediately available to remedy a situation which has existed for many years and about which the previous Government seemed to be deeply agitated but did nothing.

PROGRESSIVES WANT COMMITTEE INVESTIGATION
The feeling of the Progressives on the proposal was expressed by Mr. Forke succinctly when he declared that he was not hostile to the plan but simply critical. The attitude of himself and his followers is that they prefer to wait and see; to await what further evidence is produced before the special committee and see if the charges in the Preston report are substantiated. Also they will wait and see if the agreement is not adequate to meet the situation. They also dislike the idea of paying cash to get control of the rates and would prefer some other means of reaching that end. However, if no other means
