— ON PARLIAMENT HILL —

OTTAWA, May 2nd, 1925.—With 18 Progressives, of whom nine were from Ontario, voting with the Government, the motion of Hon. James A. Robb, Acting Minister of Finance, "to go into Committee of Ways and Means," was adopted in the House of Commons between 8 and 9 o'clock on Friday morning by a vote of 123 to 86, a Government majority of 37. The straight Conservative amendment of general censure was defeated by a vote of 48 to 164, a Government majority of 116. Thus was terminated one of the longest Budget debates in the annals of the Canadian Parliament, over one hundred members of Parliament having spoken and some miles of type in Hansard having been expended in recording their speeches. This voting, too, set the seal of approval upon a fiscal policy which aims at seeking a closer approach to unity as between the various economic and geographic sections of the Dominion by a compromise between the divergent demands of the manufacturing East and agricultural West for lower tariffs and freer trade on the one hand and on the other hand higher tariffs and restricted competition from abroad.

**CHIEF PROGRESSIVE WHIP
SUPPORTS BUDGET**

It is significant that in the division of Friday morning last there was only one member of the Liberal party opposed to the Government Budget and that was Francis N. McCrean,

a member from the English townships of Quebec, who has always and resolutely opposed tariff reductions. It is also noteworthy that the Chief Whip of the Progressive party, J. F. Johnston, a Saskatchewan member, was united with Ontario Progressives in supporting the Liberals. This indicates that in the Prairie Provinces there is a growing recognition of the efforts of the present administration to do all practicable in respecting the opposing views of the different sections of the Dominion. The majority by which the main motion for the adoption of the Budget was carried was larger than had been anticipated, the most sanguine expectation being that it would not exceed 30.

**A WARNING TO THE LONG
TALKERS**

An important feature of the Budget debate was the warning given by the Prime Minister near the conclusion of his eloquent speech early Thursday morning that if the efforts of the Government to expedite the business of Parliament were to be obstructive tactics of the Opposition he would have no hesitation in asking His Excellency the Governor General to dissolve Parliament. "I tell the House," said Premier King, "that the Government does not propose to stay here all through the hot summer months impeded in their business by two elements both going in

opposite directions at the same time. If the Government fail to expedite the business of the country as it should be expedited, I shall not hesitate to ask His Excellency to dissolve the House. I am appealing to the sense of the people of this country, that they will not tolerate a situation where the Government is continually faced with uncertainty and that they will demand that the Government should be returned with a strong majority. I have given an outline of how we have endeavored to carry on the business of the country with a small majority and a hostile Senate. Notwithstanding this, we have made a record of which any administration might be proud."

**THE PROGRESSIVE
QUANDARY**

An interesting sidelight on the present situation in Parliament and the position in which the major Progressive Group would be placed were it to actually carry out the idea in the minds of some of its members of uniting with the Conservatives and voting the Liberals out of power was presented this week in an illuminating speech by one of the Saskatchewan Progressives, Thomas H. McConica (Battleford). "This tariff situation is an important matter," said Mr. McConica. "We are going to have a vote on the Budget. I do not propose to vote for the Conservative amendment. That is quite settled in my mind. Now, how about the Budget? My hon. friends to my right (Opposition) are going to vote against it because the tariff is not high enough. My friends to my left (this fellow Progressives) are supposed to vote against it because it is too high. If I vote against it and my friends

on my right against it, and they are not with me, what am I doing? Or are we going to look for a third vote and the Government pulling that and the other pulling West? And if we cannot get going to get the credit and vote (Continued on Page 5)

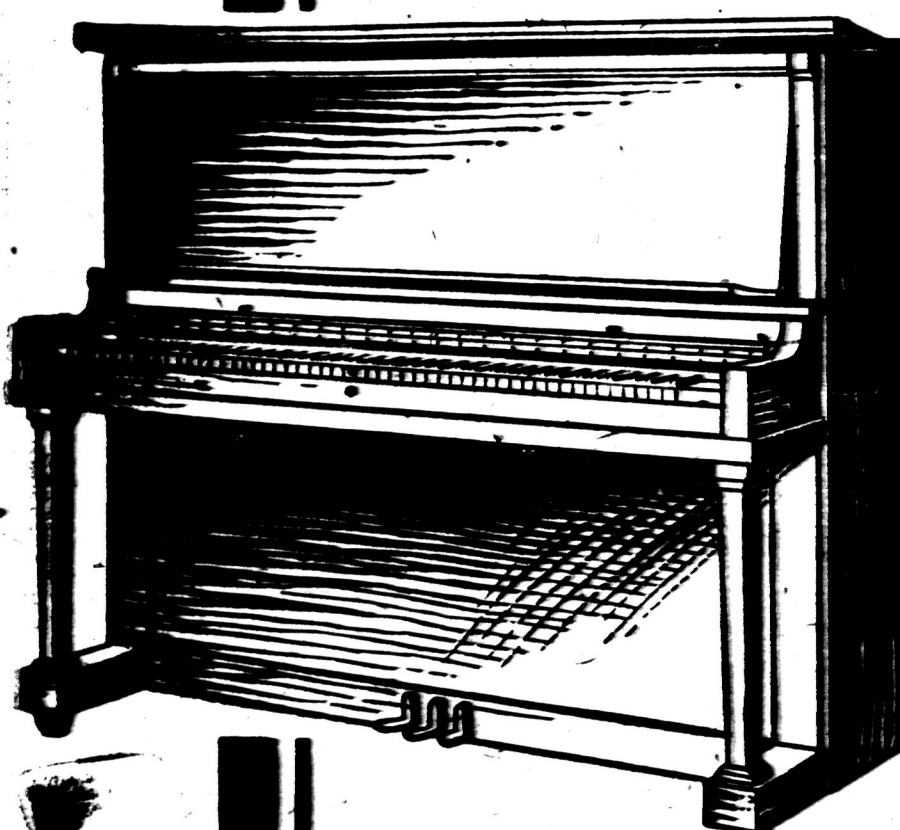

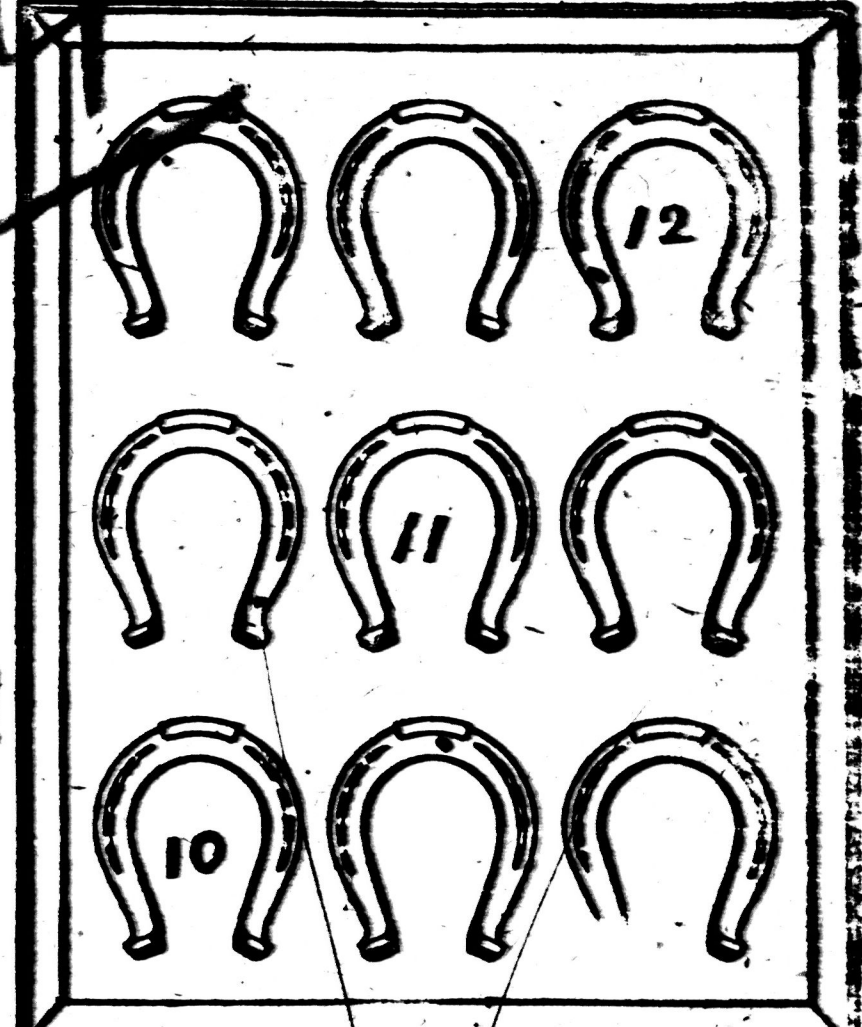
