In this connection, the secretary is sending out copies to motor clubs in the largest centres of the United States, is enclosing form letters with application blanks in which the recipients are asked to provide the names and addresses of members they know to be contemplating trips to Ontario. Immediately upon receipt of these names and addresses, copies of the booklet will be sent to them with a personal letter requesting them to tour the "Lake Erie North Shore Trail," from Detroit and Windsor to Niagara Falls and learn what a beautiful drive "The Canadian Link of the Roosevelt Highway" is. Officers of the association also are planning motor trips to each border for the purpose of arranging for the distribution during the coming summer months. Arrangements are being made to place supplies of the booklet with the motor club offices at Detroit and Windsor.

An Important Feature

The booklet, issued in railroad folder form with attractive four-color covers and 48 pages of informative matter, has many fine features that should make it a prized possession of motor tourists. Important among its features are the four official logs, explaining every twist and turn in the trail from border to border, with the inter-point mileage also supplied. The log is in four sections, viz., Niagara Falls to St. Thomas; St. Thomas to Windsor; Windsor to St. Thomas and St. Thomas to Niagara Falls. The log is authentic throughout, being compiled by experts in the employee of the Detroit Motor Club and furnished the Southern Ontario Highway Association through the courtesy of the Detroit officials. The log alone makes the bulletin invaluable to the stranger entering Ontario at either border.

Introductory, the booklet gives a brief but comprehensive sketch of the "Lake Erie North Shore Trail," referring to its historical significance and describing the natural scenic beauty and wonders along it, starting with the great cataracts at Niagara and ending with the mighty Detroit river and its teeming commerce. Page 7 of the booklet is devoted to a Canadian welcome to the American tourist with a description of a few of the pleasures that may be found in Southwestern Ontario during the golden summer months, then follow several pages dealing individually with the cities, towns and villages on the route or directly connected with it. Although space required these municipal sketches to be condensed, they are exceptionally well done and contain much useful information in regard to the social and industrial aspects of each place and the advantages they offer to persons contemplating locating in Ontario.
