Aglater, Port Hope, St. Thomas,
Port Stanley, Sheldrake, Port Char-
lotte, Port Hope, Port George,
Leamington, Kingsville, Wexford and
Windsor.

Other pages of the booklet provide
information about the many services
extended visitors to Ontario, includ-
ing official lists of the tourist camps,
golf courses and tennis courts, hotels,
restaurants and garages along the
Trail, climatic conditions, hunting
and fishing regulations and fees.
There also are pages devoted to ex-
planations regarding customs re-
quirements and the reciprocal agree-
ments existing between Canada and
the United States in reference to 30-
day visits; motoring rules in Ontario;
tourists' information bureau as
maintained by the Ontario Motor
League. Brief facts about Ontario's
productivity and variety of her farm
products, her mining activities and
road improvement system and, last
but not least, her temperance legis-
lation, also are to be found in the
booklet. The back covers carry an
official map of the Province with the
Trail shown in red and all places
along the route plainly indicated.
This map was prepared to scale for
the association by a Toronto firm.
It is authentic in every detail and
does not distort the map in order to
show the Trail to better advantage.

The front cover catches the eye.
It carries a typical scene along the
North Shore Trail showing a wind-
ing road around a wooded hill, to a
summer hotel, with old Lake Erie in
the background. An inset shows a
glimpse of the American and Cana-
dian falls at Niagara. There are
nearly 60 illustrations in the book-
let, depicting scenes along the entire
Trail, including several views of Jack
Miner's internationally-known bird
sanctuary at Kingsville.

To Help Merchants

Secretary McIntyre reports that
the association also has issued cards,
for display in the stores and other
business places along the route, draw-
ing attention of American tourists to
Article 355 in the United States
Customs Regulations which permits
each adult returning to the United
States from Canada to take with
them \$100 of goods and merchandise,
duty free. Only a comparatively few
Americans are aware of this provi-
sion in their customs laws and the as-
sociation will seek the co-operation
of Ontario business men in acquaint-
ing them with it. It is believed that
educating American tourists to this
fact will benefit Canadian tradesmen
greatly as there are few Americans
who are not anxious to take back
with them some of Canada's fine lin-
ens and woolsens as well as souvenirs.
The article making such provision
reads as follows: "Articles up to
but not exceeding \$100 in value ac-
quired abroad for personal or house-
hold use, or as souvenirs or curios,
if not intended for sale or purchased
or commission for other persons.
Such articles purchased or agreed to
be purchased abroad by returning resi-
dents may be admitted free notwith-
standing they do not accompany the
passenger." The merchants will be
requested to prominently display the
cards in the stores.
The association is preparing to ex-
tend still another service to mer-
chants and visiting tourists. Through
