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## MINUTES OF SIXTH SESSION OF THE COUNTY COUNCIL

Cayuga, Thurs., May 14, 1925.

Council met pursuant to adjournment.

All the members present except Charles S. Brown, Esq., Reeve of Hagersville.

The Warden in the chair.

Lyons-McQuillan—That the Council do now resume business with the Warden in the chair. Carried.

The minutes of the last meeting were then read.

Glenny-Wingfield—That the minutes of last meeting be adopted as read. Carried.

The following communications were read:

1. Department of Game & Fisheries—Acknowledging receipt of application for fish for Grand River.

2. Department of Highways, acknowledging receipt of 2 copies of application by-law.

Camelford-McDonald—That a by-law be introduced and read a first time, authorizing the entering into of a contract with the estate of Alfred James Dodge that on payment of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.00) the County agree to maintain John Dodge for the term of his natural life and that \$25 per month dating from the 26th day of May, 1925, be charged against the said \$1500.00 and the Warden and Clerk be authorized to execute a conveyance of all the right, title and interest of the said John Dodge in certain lands described in said contract. ## IMPRESSIVE SERVICE AT PT. DOVER AS REV. D. MACINNES IS INDUCTED AS PASTOR OF KNOX CHURCH

Rev. Mr. MacInnes Is Fifth Minister To Be Inducted As Pastor of Knox Church, Port Dover, In Period of Over Seventy-four Years. Congregation Turn Out En Masse To Greet Their New Leader.

It is a good many years ago that the last induction service was held in Knox Church, Port Dover—July, 1889—when the Rev. John Robertson assumed the pastoral cares of the Church. For a period of nearly thirty five years Mr. Robertson ministered to the needs of the parish; his resignation taking effect on April 5th.

Many who were present at that induction service in '89 have passed to the Great Beyond, but there are at least a few left who were able to be present and take part in the induction service of their new Pastor, Rev. Donald MacInnes, of Kingston, who assumed new responsibilities on the handing over to his care and keeping on Tuesday evening last of the affairs of Knox Church, Port Dover.

Rev. W. G. West (of Dunnville) Moderator of the Presbytery of Hamilton, had charge of the evening's service and it fell to the lot of the Rev. J. H. Whitelaw, of Hagersville, to challenge to all and sundry to appear before him and state their reasons (if any) why the Rev. Donald MacInnes was not worthy to be inducted as pastor of this church.

### The Opening Exercises.

There being no objections raised the service proceeded. Choir and congregation joined in singing hymn 371a.

O Spirit of the living God,  
In all Thy plenitude of grace,  
Where'er the foot of man hath trod  
Descend on our apostate race.

Then came the scripture reading in Psalm 46: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." The Lord of Hosts is with us, the God of Jacob is our refuge.

A prayer by Rev. Mr. Whitelaw was followed by an anthem rendered in fine style by the choir, the solo parts being sustained by Miss Jean Barron, Miss Grace MacAulay, R. Davidson and choir leader Chas. R. Nunn.

Sermon by Rev. J. M. Whitelaw.

For nearly forty minutes Rev. J. M. Whitelaw held the undivided attention of the vast congregation in his wonderfully inspiring and edifying sermon. Choosing for his texts (i.) Isaiah 21—11 "The burden of Dumah. He calleth me out of Seir, Watchman, what of the night?" and (ii.) Psalm 46—10 "Be still, and know that I am God." The speaker took his hearers down the stream of time from the days of Abraham and Sarah to the present time, noting that the clouds appeared and things seemed in chaotic condition and there was on so many occasions heard the message: "Watchman, what of the night?" And yet down through the ages from time immemorial there has always come the reassuring answer of the Master: "Be still! And know that I am God!" The speaker recalled that today Canada was in the position of Dumah—a baffled state—and the

eyes of the whole world were now focussed upon the church. Looking to the future we might well use the text: "Watchman what of the night" and one hears in the distance the reassuring word of the divine: "Be still and know that I am God."

### Church People Are Optimists.

Mr. Whitelaw declared that he could not be a pessimist. He just simply had to be an optimist in spite of the present apparent chaotic conditions that seemed to prevail. He urged all present to be optimists and to seek the greater things of life and that when storms and perplexities confronted them and they were tempted to doubt and utter Watchman what of the night? they would not seek in vain for the answer "Whistle and know that I am God."

Following the sermon choir and congregation joined heartily in hymn 270:

Breathe on me, Breath of God,  
Fill me with life anew  
That I may love what Thou dost love  
And do what Thou wouldst do.

### Interim Moderator Gives Report.

At the request of the Moderator, Rev. W. T. Brown of Jarvis (Interim Moderator) outlined the details leading up to the call of the Rev. Donald MacInnes. He recalled that at the March meeting of the Presbytery of Hamilton the resignation of the Rev. J. Robertson, Pastor of Knox Church, Port Dover and Victoria Presbyterian Church was received and after due consideration was accepted with regret. Mr. Brown was appointed Interim Moderator. The pulpits were declared vacant on the first sabbath in April (5th inst.) and arrangements were immediately made for the hearing of candidates. Three candidates were heard. Mr. MacInnes being the second. After hearing Mr. MacInnes the congregation expressed a strong desire to extend to him the call to Knox Church and he, as Interim Moderator, called a meeting of the congregation and the call was sustained. It was brought down through the customary channels to the Hamilton Presbytery and on May 5th was sustained as a regular gospel call.

Moderator Delivers Charge to Pastor

The charge to the pastor-elect was delivered by the Moderator of the Presbytery, all members of the Presbytery standing.

Rev. G. M. Ross, M.A., of Oneida Addresses New Pastor.

Immediately following the reading of the charge to the Rev. MacInnes, the Rev. G. M. Ross, M.A. cordially welcomed the new pastor to the Presbytery of Hamilton. He counselled him to keep close to Christ Jesus; to walk before Him in love with true meekness, and rich blessing will be yours. And may you never be without Him. (Continued on Page 4)

The following are the questions asked by the Moderator of the Rev. Donald MacInnes, and the answers given thereto before the Pastoral Charge was handed over to the care and guidance of the new Pastor:

- 1.—DO YOU BELIEVE the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God, and the only infallible rule of faith and manners? I DO.
- 2.—DO YOU BELIEVE the Westminster Confession of Faith, as adopted by this Church in the Basis of Union, to be founded on and agreeable to the Word of God, and in your teaching do you promise faithfully to adhere thereto? I DO.

- 4.—DO YOU OWN the purity of worship at present authorized by this Church, and do you undertake to conform thereto? I DO.
- 5.—DO YOU PROMISE to give a dutiful attendance in the Courts of this Church, to submit yourself in the spirit of meekness to the admonitions of this Presbytery, to be subject to it and the superior Courts, to follow no divisive course, but maintain according to your power the unity and peace of the Church. I DO.
- 6.—ARE YOU ZEAL FOR THE GLORY OF GOD, love to the Lord Jesus Christ, and desire of saving souls, so far as you know your own heart, your great motives and chief inducements to enter the office of the ministry? THEY ARE.
- 7.—HAVE YOU directly or indirectly used any undue means to procure this call? NO.
- 8.—DO YOU ENGAGE in the strength and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, to live a holy and circumspect life; to rule well your own house, and faithfully and diligently to discharge all the duties of the ministry to the edification of the body of Christ? I DO.

DO YOU ACCEPT the Pastoral Care of this Parish? I DO.

To The Congregation:  
DO YOU ACCEPT the Rev. Donald MacInnes as your Pastor. WE DO

To Pastor-Elect:  
In the Name of the LORD JESUS CHRIST, the only King and Head of the Church, and by the authority of the Presbytery of Hamilton, I induct you to the pastoral charge of this congregation, and admit you to all the rights and privileges thereto pertaining. And may God bless you.
