out God's abundant mercies.

"I would have you always to remember these three things:

- i. Put Christ in the forefront of your thoughts;
- ii. Realize the presence of Jesus Christ in you at all times; and
- iii. Aim at definite results.

In closing Mr. Ross urged the newly inducted pastor to heed the words of Paul to Timothy:

"I charge thee therefore before God, and the Lord Jesus Christ, who shall judge the quick and the dead at his appearing and his kingdom; Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all long suffering and doctrine."

Rev. W. T. Brown in Happy Strain.

The Rev. W. T. Brown addressed his remarks to the congregation and being away from home he did not attempt to mince his words. The induction service provided for a charge to the minister and a charge to the congregation. It was his privilege to deliver the charge to the congregation. Mr. MacInnes was a young man and had left college with certain definite ideas and ideals. He had felt the call of our Lord and Master to do His work. He was full of youthful enthusiasm and filled with a passion to do his part in the building up of the Kingdom of God. Too often congregations are apt to give the impression that they don't get what they look for from the minister—they don't measure up. The minister has enthusiasm and ideals and you, as a congregation, should give him every encouragement to keep these ideas fresh that he brings with him. A minister will stand up here Sunday after Sunday and preach to you and as you leave the church he will often stand and wonder if the message he has given has felt on good ground. Has he given you the message you were needing? Has he measured up? You should not be complimenting your minister all the time—but you should not withhold that word of encouragement that can be given in all sincerity. Yes, encourage your minister. He will make mistakes—but you must learn to overlook these and aim to reach for the bigger things of life. Support your minister by being loyal to him. He is your choice—you called him to your church, and if you are not loyal, then you cannot hope to be a successful church.

Must Have Co-operation.

Co-operate with your minister—co-operate by prayer and ask that he shall be given the message that you are looking for. Come to the services and hear the message he has prepared for you from time to time; that is, a minister who is doing his best to find that he is faced with so many empty pews at the services. He has devoted hours of study to the preparation of his sermon and on the sabbath he finds that the people who should be occupying the pews are enjoying the sabbath in divers other ways. People get careless and indifferent. So I implore you, the congregation of K. C. Church, Port Dover, to co-operate with and seal with the

Rev. Mr. MacInnes in all he is striving to do. There may be different methods, etc., to what you might be accustomed but try and adjust yourself to these new ways and help in every way you can.

Be Considerate.

Do not expect your minister to know everything, continued the rev. gentleman. Don't expect him to know of sickness, etc. in his parish without being told. He doesn't carry a radio in his head that will keep him acquainted with all these things. Tell him or phone to him and he'll be only too glad to come and visit.

Give him leisure time for study. Do not be expecting him to be visiting all the time he is not in the church. He must have leisure hours in which to prepare and study and commune with God to get the message that you need. Every minister needs time to study and develop.

And when the time comes that your minister feels he needs help in the work, and he takes unto himself the work, and he takes unto himself a wife, you must remember that the congregation does not own her. Do not complain because she does not visit and does not do a great amount of work that you thought she would have done. The congregation has not called her, their call was to the pastor.

There is a great work ahead for this congregation, declared Mr. Brown. And there were great opportunities in the building up of the Kingdom of God in this place. The pastor will do with his might whatever his hands find to do, and the congregation must do their part too.

Rev. Donald MacInnes Speaks.

The newly inducted pastor said that this induction service would be long remembered throughout his life. At college they had been discussing the outlook and some had said that they would go out into the world at a bad time owing to the chaotic condition of the church today. He thought, however, that this was a splendid time and a time that would bring out the best in each man. There was real work to be done. Considerable enthusiasm had been shown here to-night which he expressed the hope would be continued. Love for the church and for the things for which the church stands: love for home; love for the community and love of country were true ideals of service.

Rev. Robertson Extends Cordial Good Wishes To New Pastor.

Rev. John Robertson said it was indeed a pleasure for him to again stand where he had stood for so many Sunday as witness of pre-achieve Sundays to bring to them the high ideals of the Christ. He wished the new pastor abundant prosperity for the days ahead. He had the sincerest hope that Mr. MacInnes will be abundantly blessed.

At the close of the meeting R. A. Barron, M.A., and Matthias Schiltz led the pastor to the door where he was introduced to those of his congregation and others present.

The church was profusely decorated with an abundance of roses and other spring blossoms and before the service the ladies of the congregation served a banquet spread, over three hundred and fifty sitting down to a sumptuous repast.

Many out-of-town visitors were present for the occasion and all were delighted with the spirit of co-operation and harmony that was evident throughout the entire proceedings.
