The above includes the junior seat in Queen's, P.E.I., in the Conservative column, where the checking up by deputy returning officers to-day gave John Messery, Conservative, 24 majority over Hon. E. Sinclair, minister without portfolio in the King Cabinet. Balancing this, however, an official count in North Bay announced tonight gave E. A. Lapierre, Liberal, a majority of 53 in Nipissing, Ont., over John Ferguson, Conservative. Unofficial counts had given this seat to Mr. Ferguson.

Provencher, Manitoba, which is a race between the Liberals and Progressives, is still in the doubtful column. Another, Bonaventure, Quebec, was added today to the doubtful list. In this riding Hon. Charles Marcell was first reported to be elected, but outlying polls have placed the result in doubt, the latest report giving Major Papuet, Conservative, a lead of 22 with 19 polls still to be heard from.
