mand; types of marketing organiza-
tions; methods of organizing, financ-
ing and managing co-operatives; the
pooling system; marketing contracts;
progress of co-operative marketing
in Ontario.

Apiculture—The care and manage-
ment of bees, including wintering,
feeding and swarming; extracted hon-
ey; apiary equipment; prevention and
treatment of bee diseases.

Farm Forestry—The Farm Wood
Lot; planting roadside trees; wind-
breaks; ornamentation of farm build-
ings area; reforesting waste lands.

English and Mathematics—English:
Capitalization and Punctuation—Ex-
ercises in punctuation, spelling and
writing, correction of written work.
The sentence—Simple, compound and
complex, oral and written exercises.
The Paragraph—Study of simple par-
agraphs, exercises on simple and
familiar topics. Composition—Unity
and Coherence in Composition. Cor-
respondence—Letter forms, business
and personal letters, formal and so-
cial letters, telegrams and advertise-
ments. English Reference Library—
Use of dictionary, encyclopedia and
reference work. Public Speaking—
Practice debates, reading in public,
speaking on familiar topics. Mathe-
matics: Simple arithmetic and farm
bookkeeping.

OUTLINE OF COURSE IN HOME ECONOMICS

Foods and Cookery—Food values
in relation to health; practical dem-
onstrations in preparing and cooking
vegetables, fruits, milk, cereals and
cheese, meats, fish, bread and quick
bread, desserts, pastry, cakes, sal-
ads, school lunches, party refresh-
ments and invalid cookery; canning
and preserving; menu-planning; ta-
ble-setting and serving.

Laundering—Washing cotton, lin-
ens, wool and silk; soaps and wash-
ing chemicals; soap making; removing
stains; ironing; dry cleaning.

Household Administration—Care of
the house; plans of work, labor sav-
ing devices; cleaning agents; sanita-
tion; household pests; heating, ven-
tilation, water systems; household ac-
counts; homekeepers' helps in bulle-
tins and books.

Housecleaning and Decoration—
General rules in house planning;
drafting plans. General rules in house
furnishing; color schemes, decorating
and furnishing the different rooms
of the house, with approximate cost.

Home Nursing and First Aid—
General instruction for daily health
and hygiene; symptoms; preventative
measures. First Aid in fractures,
dislocations, wounds, hemorrhage;
practice in bandaging; artificial res-
piration. Baths and packs; nursing
pneumonia and typhoid. Taking
temperature, pulse and respiration.
Equipping the sick room. Disinfect-
ants. Care of the mother and baby.

Sewing—Choice of style and ma-
terials; use of patterns, cutting, fit-
ting and draftings; stitches and ma-
chine work; garment making, remod-
elling.

Millinery—Making shapes and flow-
ers; covering shapes, trimming.

Here and There

"Canada has the greatest oppor-
tunity of any community on the face
of the earth," stated St. Lee Strachy,
editor and proprietor of the London
Spectator, in the course of a recent
address before the Canadian Club.
He stressed the advantages the coun-
try enjoyed in her large wheat area,
electrical energy, wood pulp and
mineral assets.

Between 20,000 and 25,000 men are
expected to work in the forests of
the Province of Quebec during the
coming winter, according to the chief
forester of the province. It is an-
ticipated there will be a good season
for the pulp and paper products, but
that the cut of lumber will not be
so heavy owing to the low price pre-
valent for sawn lumber.

Cordial relations between the ports
of Quebec and Liverpool were em-
phasized recently by the exchange
of cables by the respective Chief
Magistrates of the two cities. The
occasion was the Civic Week Celebra-
tion at Liverpool when the Lord
Mayor, Thomas Dowd, sent Mayor
Joseph Samson, of Quebec, greet-
ings to which the latter responded.

A record for October weddings
was established at the Windsor Sta-
tion, Montreal, early in that month,
when twenty couples invaded the
Concourse on their way to Boston,
Quebec, Ottawa and Toronto. Two
of the bridegrooms were bounced
following time-honored custom. It
used to be the fashion to subject
brides to this usage, but since the
advent of short skirts the practice
has been frowned upon.

Establishing what is easily a world
record for movement of wheat, grain
poured into Port William and Port
Arthur elevators at the rate of
nearly thirty bushels a second for
the whole of the 24 hours of October
5, from Canadian Pacific Railway
cars. In all, 1,704 cars were un-
loaded during the day and each car
carries an average load of 1,500
bushels, representing a total of 2-
556,000 bushels.

Driving into stationary trains on
level crossings seems to be a favorite
sport on the part of a number of
motorists judging by reports com-
ing in recently from different sec-
tions. The latest is from Galt,
where an automobile, in broad day-
light, ran into a freight train con-
sisting of 18 loaded and 15 empty
cars standing in plain view on a
crossing. Fortunately no one was
hurt, but the instance is another of
gross carelessness on the part of
motorists.

The Grand Challenge Cup, em-
blematic of the First Aid champion-
ship of the entire system of the
Canadian Pacific Railway, was won
by the Weston Shops team, of Win-
ning, champions of the West,
against McAdam, N.B., team, cham-
pions of the East and last year's
winners, after a searching test of
the two teams conducted at the Place
Viger Hotel, Montreal, recently. The
margin between the two teams was
so narrow as to be in doubt to the
last moment. Weston took 507
points out of a possible 672 and
McAdam had 499.

Tourist traffic development
throughout Canada has reached such
proportions as to equal the value of
a fairly good wheat crop, and such
development has only just begun, is
the opinion of Colonel Phil Moore,
of Yoho Valley, B.C., interviewed re-
cently. He thought that an estimate
of three hundred million dollars
spent by tourists annually in Canada
was not too high. Growth of interest
in the Canadian Rockies was very
noticeable and although the majority
of tourists there were Americans,
yet Canadians, too, were beginning
