## Our Grandmother Tongue.

If English is our mother-tongue, why, of course, Anglo-Saxon is our grandmother language, for it is the mother of the English speech. Let me tell a few of the interesting things that may be told of this very aged lady.

In the first place, she belongs to a very ancient and respectable family. She is a sister of the Latin and Greek tongues, and possesses certain strong family traits.

For instance, our grandmother-tongue has, like those of her two sisters, declensions for the nouns, and conjugations for the verbs. There are no less than four of the former, while there are five cases, instead of three only, as in English. There are three genders for adjectives, and for the personal pronouns three numbers.

With six conjunctions and a most delicate subjunctive mood and plenty of tense, every shade of meaning may be expressed, the sisters—Latin and Greek scarcely eclipsing our dear grandmother in this beautiful feature. Unlike the French, Anglo-Saxon is inflected; and like the German, the order of the words in the sentences as they fall from our grandmother's

lips need to be changed into our English arrangement.

It will be a good thing if the study of our grandmother tongue be more generally introduced into schools and colleges. It would be as good discipline as that of her relatives of Greece and Italy, and far more useful.

To teachers of grammar, an acquaintance with the old lady would be particularly beneficial. Few teachers ever know that "oved" is merely a contracted form of our grandmother's love-did; that "methinks" is not poetical English at all, but, on the contrary, Anglo-Saxon prose, and means "to me it seems"; and that, in "he went a-fishing," the a is the preposition on—"he went on fishing." In fact, nearly all our present grammatical forms come from this respectable ancestor.

## SICKNESS HEALED BY SPIRITUAL MEANS

Christian Science Lecturer  
Claims No Incurable Disease.

The Christian Science lecture broadcast from Massey Hall, Toronto, gave many an opportunity to hear for the first time something authentic about the subject.

After half a century of growth the claims of Christian Science that spiritual healing is today practical is being recognized by material systems of healing and by the older churches. The lecturer, Robert Stanley Ross, of New York, spoke in part as follows:

Christian Science is demonstrating that it is the Christianity of Jesus made practicable today. Now, as of old, it is showing mankind how to escape from all evil. No matter how long one has been ill, no matter how deeply one may be involved in sin, no matter how heavy one's burden of sorrow, poverty, or care, Christian Science joyfully points the way out, not through death and the so-called hereafter, but here and now. The Bible tells us that the kingdom of God, the kingdom of heaven, is at hand, here, now; and that now is the day of salvation; that now are we the sons of God.

All of us know that an ugly disposition (which is a mental state) will manifest itself in harsh, unlovely features (supposedly a physical state); whereas a gentle disposition (which is a mental state) will manifest itself in a smiling and serene countenance. Some one has well said that if fear, irritability, and hate will distort the features, they will distort likewise the heart, stomach, and liver. Why not? Jesus recognized clearly that it is not mere food which disarranges the human system, but fear, sensuality, hate, and other poisonous, destructive beliefs.

Writing on page 248 of Science and Health, Mrs. Eddy says: "Let unselfishness, goodness, mercy, justice, health, holiness, love—the kingdom of heaven—reign within us, and sin, disease, and death will diminish until they finally disappear." All of which indicates that mortals are healthy or unhealthy, happy or unhappy, strong or weak, alive or dead, in the proportion that their thinking is good or bad, spiritual or material. Centuries ago the wise man said: "As he (a man) thinketh in his heart, so he is."

In the sight of infinite Love there are no incurable diseases; there never have been, there never will be any. The Psalmist knew this when he sang: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits: who forgetteth all thine iniquities; who hearkeneth all thine iniquities and all thy diseases, not some of them."

## Keeping the School Band Intact Throughout the Entire Year.

The school band is dependent upon two important factors for its existence: morale and loyalty to the organization. The first is built up by cultivating in the boy's mind a pride in his performing with and helping to produce an organization that is of some consequence to the school and community. The second is based upon the "gang spirit" of the boy. A boy has a pride in numbers of his kind.

A band should be organized as an integral part of the school. It should not be organized around any other interest. For instance: some bands are built up in the fall to play for the games. When the games are over the band breaks up. A band can be made self-maintaining if the proper interest is aroused in the boys' minds.

A series of concerts in the early spring or a tour will do much to heighten the efficiency of the band and tighten the organization.

## Tallow From Trees.

In Sierra Leone grows the cream-fruit tree, the fruit of which has the taste of cream and is very agreeable to the palate. In Ceylon there is a bread-fruit tree, from which a type of bread is made. It is said to compare favorably with the ordinary article.

In South America we find a milk tree, and a tree that grows in Sumatra is known as the vegetable tallow tree. Probably the Eskimos would like to get this to grow in the Arctic regions, for the early Arctic explorers had a taste for it. It is said to compare favorably with their candles as dessert for meals.

Excellent candles are made from the berries of another tree which grows in South Africa and the Azores.

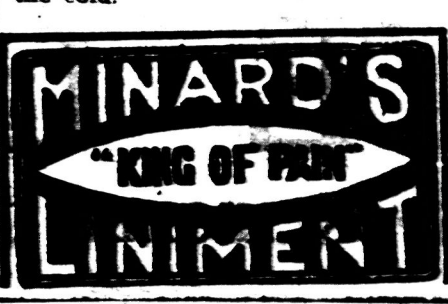

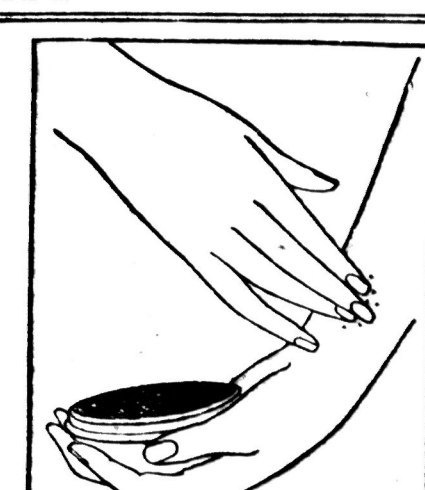
