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THIEVES PAY JARVIS A SECOND VISIT

BOOTH & ALLEN'S GARAGE AND
E. T. CARTER'S STORE EN-
TERED BY THIEVES

Shortly after midnight on Wednesday last thieves entered Booth & Allen's garage and E. T. Carter's store and made a clean get-away with their loot.

Access to the premises was gained through the front doors, and judging from the appearance of the marks the same methods were employed.

The burglary was discovered by P. Bagnall, who was on his way to his blacksmith shop early Thursday morning. He immediately communicated with the proprietors.

Booth & Allen lost goods to the value of about \$800, consisting of tires, tubes and two radios, one a 5-tube set which had just been unpacked the day before the robbery and a 4-tube set which had been connected up.

E. T. Carter suffered a loss of goods to the value of about \$600, consisting of guns, ammunition and various hardware articles.

This robbery, following so closely upon the previous one, has caused grave concern and methods for better protection in the village are under consideration.

APPLE CROP BEST ONTARIO HAS HAD

"From the standpoint of quality, this year's apple crop is one of the best Ontario has ever gathered," said Hon. J. S. Martin, Minister of Agriculture. "In view of this fact, the Government feels justified in particularly commending it to the people of Ontario and elsewhere. We have a special interest in the crop because in the early growing months we were able to render considerable assistance to the growers in spraying the trees and the application of the best methods of production. Partly due to this fact, an extraordinary percentage of the crop will grade No. 1. We feel that the consumers should take advantage of the opportunity to secure this high class orchard product. It will be available everywhere at moderate prices."

"In order to facilitate the marketing of this splendid crop," the Minister added, "the Department is rendering assistance in two ways. In the first place, it is supervising the grading and handling, and guaranteeing the price in connection with exports of certain leading standard varieties, to the extent of 25,000 barrels. Most of this will go into undeveloped markets and as it will bear the Government stamp as to quality, it is expected to establish the name of Ontario for apples of high quality. A large portion of the crop will, of course, go to the British market and the Western market, but there will be plenty left for the people in Ontario. In order to bring this opportunity to the attention of all the people, the Department is sponsoring an advertising campaign which will place the value of apples prominently before the consumer by means of the daily and weekly press. Rockford, Oct. 16, 1925.

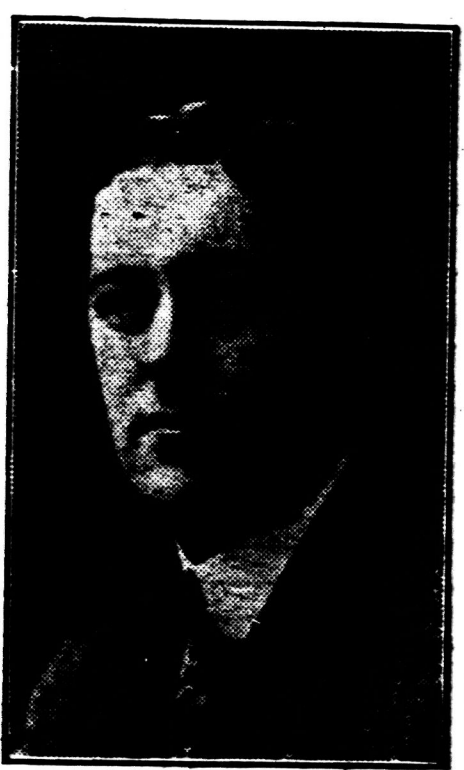
To Our Dear Sunday School Teacher.

The competition was held at Caledonia on Oct. 14th. Thirty-one entries were received for the competition, but only 26 young men took part. The following farms were visited for the purpose of judging stock: J. W. Richardson, dairy cattle and swine; Jas. Douglas, beef cattle and Leicester sheep; Andrew Knox, Shropshire sheep; George Miller, heavy horses.

Contestants were required to judge nine classes of stock and make their placings. After the judging was completed, those taking part in the competition assembled at the town hall, Caledonia and gave oral reasons for the various classes of stock judged, after which the program consisted of having each judge give the correct placings and reasons for the various classes of stock judged. When the judges completed their part of the program, the results of the competition were announced. Winner of the Lalor Cup, 1925, Elmer Schwyer, Jarvis R. R. 3; winner of the Jaques Trophy, 1925, W. Irwin Swick, Canfield. These cups were presented to the young men mentioned by the Agricultural Representative and they made very appropriate replies.
