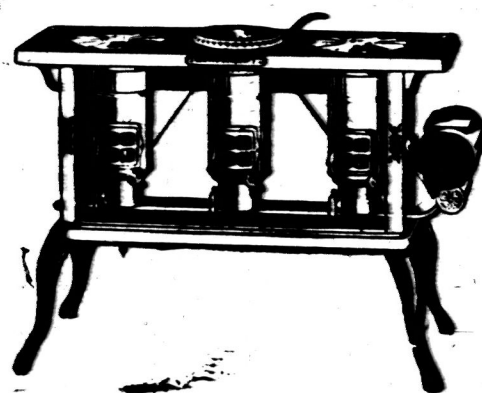

## DRAMATIC REUNIONS.

Wealth That Came When All Seemed Lost.

The recent meeting at Southampton between a Mr. Hannaway Rowe and his son, each of whom thought the other had been dead some years, has had many a parallel still more dramatic. Not long ago the Assize Court of Leeds was the scene of a sensational meeting between a father and his son. A well-known K.C. had been retained to prosecute in a case of robbery with violence. When the prisoner was brought into the dock the K.C. cast a keen glance at him. A look of surprise and horror came into his face, and with a cry of "Good heavens! it's Harry!" he fell back into his seat.

The prisoner was, in fact, the son of the prosecuting counsel. He had taken to evil ways and had disappeared a few years earlier, only to meet his father again under these tragic conditions.

A few years ago the police court of an English town was the scene of a remarkable meeting. When a prisoner charged with begging was placed in the dock the magistrate was amazed to recognize in him an old master, of to recognize in him an old master, and a man who, years earlier, had sat in the very seat of judgment he himself occupied.

The story is a remarkable one. A number of unlucky speculations, however, drove him to drink and neglect his business, and within a few years he became bankrupt and disappeared from his native town. Nothing more was seen of him until, drifting back to his old haunts, he was arrested on a charge of begging, and was recognized by the magistrate who in other days had been one of his own employers.

In 1896 a mechanic in the Midlands disappeared, leaving his wife and a baby daughter destitute. Nothing was heard of him for many years. Meanwhile his wife had died in the workhouse, and his daughter drifted to London, where she fell into extreme poverty and ill-health.

One day in 1922 a well-dressed, middle-aged man was walking along the Strand when he was accosted by a man and shabbily-dressed young woman with the words, "Please, sir, buy a box of matches. For a few moments he looked at her as if fascinated. Then he asked: "What is your name, my girl?" She told him, and he stood as if rooted to the spot, exclaiming, "Is it possible you are my daughter? You are certainly the image of her mother."

It was not only possible. It was true, as further inquiries proved. The girl found herself transferred from poverty to wealth by a father who had amassed a fortune while she starved, and had returned to make amends for his desertion of her and her mother.

In 1910 a clerk disappeared from his home in Highgate, leaving behind this note to his wife: "I have struggled hard to live peacefully with you, but I find it quite hopeless. I am now going to end a life which you have made miserable. Good-bye!"

From that day to July, 1921, not a trace of the vanished husband was found, although his now disconsolate "widow" left no stone unturned to discover his fate. Then, eleven years after his disappearance, she met and recognized him within a stone's throw of her own door. She found that during all the years she had mourned him as lost he was actually living in a street not four minutes' walk from her residence, but so changed and disguised that his name and intimate friends had failed to identify him. She would have passed him had he not betrayed himself by raising his hand and clutching his left ear—a habit with which she was familiar and which was peculiar to him.

## The Amazon.

The Amazon is the greatest river in the world, being estimated at over 4,000 miles in length. The area of the basin is 2,700,000 square miles, two-fifths of South America. Its most remote sources are found in the inter-Andean plateau, but a short distance from the Pacific, and after a course of about 4,000 miles, through the interior of Peru and across Brazil, it enters the Atlantic Ocean on the equator. The head stream is the Alta Marañon in Peru, which issues from Lauritache Lake at an altitude of 11,800 feet. Numerous affluents form a great network of streams, practically traversing the entire continent and debouching into the Atlantic at the rate of 2,452,000 cubic feet per second. Alta Marañon becomes navigable for small craft below Manaticha, 250 miles from the Pacific and 2,700 miles from the Atlantic. Ocean-going steamers penetrate to Iquitos, 1,935 miles from the mouth. The breadth at the mouth is 200 miles and from three to four miles or more at 1,000 miles from the ocean. There are numerous marshy islands at the mouth, the largest, Manajé, being 2,000 square miles. The total length of the waterways in the system is 35,000 miles.

## Guaraní Pictures Are Ours.

An attempt was made recently to steal a very valuable Guaraní picture from the home of an English owner, Miss Miss Southgate. One of the valuable specimens known to British hunters as a "Joseph," or a "The Jew," this particular Guaraní was given to Miss Southgate by the British in token of his admiration for her playing. Similarly, Papah's famous Guaraní was given to a rich girl by a French merchant, and on the great 25th of June, it passed, by his will, to the Guaraní Museum of his native Canada, where it still lies. For this instrument Ives and Haily, of Chicago, offered \$50,000.

They Don't Want to Go Home. Guaraní who left their native land to come to Canada have often been seen in the South American countries and the rest of the world.
