PASS BY-LAW COMPELLING ALL TAXPAYERS TO DEPOSIT TAXES IN BANK

The Municipal Council of Walpole met in the Village of Jarvis, Sept. 12, pursuant to adjournment. All members present with Reeve W. G. Clark in the chair.

The minutes of last meeting were read and adopted, also several communications were read and dealt with by the Council.

Laidlaw-Shoup—That this Council pass a by-law to raise money for the general expenses of the Township for 1925.

Waterbury-Saunders—That this Council pass a by-law to provide money for the different School Sections of the Township for the year 1925.

Shoup-Waterbury—That this Council pass a by-law to have the tax notices mailed by the clerk or some other person to the taxpayers of the Township requesting them to deposit their taxes in the Bank of Commerce, Jarvis, Hagersville or Selkirk branches.

The said taxes to be paid on or before the first day of December, next, and each year thereafter at said date.

The following is a copy of by-law: WHEREAS the Municipal Council of the Township of Walpole consider that it would be in the interest of the said Township to have all taxpayers in the said Township of Walpole deposit their taxes in the Canadian Bank of Commerce in Jarvis, Hagersville or Selkirk branches.

Therefore, be it enacted and it is hereby enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Walpole in council assembled, that all taxes in the said Township of Walpole shall be deposited in any of the branches of the Bank of Commerce in Jarvis, Hagersville or Selkirk, to the credit of the said Township of Walpole. And in such case the taxpayer or his agent shall obtain a receipt from banker for the same.

And the said Council shall appoint some person to prepare and send by mail the tax notices or deliver the same personally to each of the taxpayers in the said Township of Walpole.

And the said Council shall demand and require that all taxes must be paid as aforesaid, on or before the first day of December next and each year thereafter at said date.

All persons failing to pay their taxes at said time, December 1, 5% penalty will be added to their taxes.
