Not many years ago a small room accommodated the meeting of the directors and officers of Haldimand Women's Institute. On Tuesday last, a gathering of seventy partook of a banquet, provided by the Cayuga branch, prior to the annual meeting held in the Methodist church in the afternoon.

R. S. Colter, reeve of Cayuga; J. L. Mitchener, I. P. S.; C. C. Main, Agri. Rep.; C. R. Bilger, Supt. Children's Aid; Geo. P. Brown, Supt. House of Refuge; D. Duff, Principal Public School, and F. S. Kent, Chairman of Board of Education, all guests at the banquet, gave short addresses stressing the benefits the W. I. had rendered in their several departments.

The meeting was called at 2 p.m., 15 out of 24 branches being represented, the total attendance being 78. After the opening ode and prayer, an expression of sympathy from the gathering was forwarded to Mrs. A. Lamb, first vice-president, who is critically ill. The secretary's report followed. Three new branches, Cheapside, Oneida Jrs. and Caledonia Jrs., have been added during the year, the total membership being in a fair way to reach the one thousand objective set a year ago. An exchange of papers among the branches was recommended, these to be forwarded to the President, Mrs. Peart, and to be used at her discretion.

6. That the Messrs. Miller and McDonald be delegates to the Ontario School Trustees and Ratepayers Association at Toronto next month.
