CONFERENCE OF BOYS' WORK BOARD

About fifty boys from the churches in Hagersville, Cheapside, Springvale, Selkirk, Caledonia, Canfield, Cayuga, Dumfries and Nanticoke met in the United Church, Cayuga, on April 9th and 10th, and enjoyed two very interesting addresses from Mr. J. M. Finlay, Field Secretary of the Ontario Boys' Work Board, and all took a very active part in the discussion of such subjects as "World Brotherhood," "Home Relationship," "Haldimand County Activities," and "Vocational Guidance," led by Rev. E. Brearly, Rev. H. Wright, Rev. J. M. Oestreich and Mr. J. M. Finlay.

On Friday evening, Reeve Coulter in a few well-chosen words extended a most hearty welcome to the visitors, after which Dr. Billings rendered a solo which was much appreciated by all. This was followed by Mr. Finlay's address who, in his remarks, stated that the youth of today were asking for something to do which would tax all their powers of resourcefulness and which would satisfy their longing for adventure. To every boy he threw out the challenge to dare to live the Jesus Way. He said that he knew of no greater adventure, nor one which promised a richer reward.

Saturday morning was spent in organization and discussion. At 8 p.m. after all had done full justice to a very bountiful banquet, prepared by the Ladies Aid, a very hearty vote of thanks was tendered them.

In his address after the banquet, Mr. Finlay stirred the hearts of everyone present as he compared the Jesus Way with other ways. He proved very conclusively that the Jesus Way would work if we only gave it a chance.

After the closing ceremony, the feeling of deep regret of breaking the fellowship which had sprung up, was brightened only by the prospects of coming together again next year.

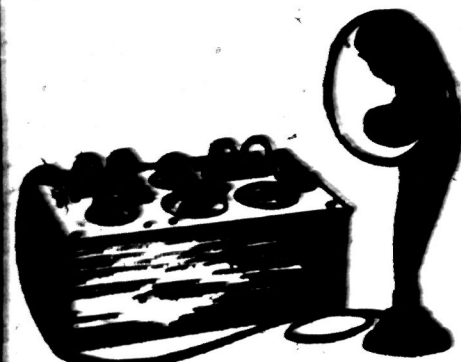
WELL-KNOWN CAYUGA MAN STRICKEN SUDDENLY

Mr. Thomas Murray, a well-known Cayuga resident, was found dead at his home on Saturday afternoon last. He had been in his usual health and his wife went up to Hagersville in the morning. Returning in the afternoon she found her husband lying dead on the dining-room floor. Death was caused by a paralytic stroke.

Mr. Murray was born in Scotland in 1859 and came to Canada in 1881. He lived in the Township of North Cayuga until about 10 years ago, when he and his wife moved to Cayuga. JARVIS COW TESTING ASSOCIATION

At a special Dairy Meeting held in Peacock's Hall, Jarvis, on April 8th, the Jarvis Cow Testing Association was organized with 13 members and 130 cows. The meeting was addressed by Messrs. Marritt, Hems, Gibson and Christensen, and the advantages of cow testing work clearly pointed out to the farmers. Mr. Marshall, Manager of the Jarvis Creamery, assisted in advertising the meeting by distributing 550 copies of a circular letter to patrons of the Jarvis Creamery. The Jarvis Creamery is also assisting in cow testing work by loaning their testing room and equipment for testing the milk.

The plan of carrying on the Association is as follows:—

1. Each farmer to supply his own weighing and sampling equipment. The cost of equipment is as follows: Scales—A \$6 set or a \$2 set Milk Box—75c Sample Bottles—5c each Dipper—15c

2. To weigh and take a sample of milk of each cow night and mornings on three days each month, say 10th, 20th and 30th, and record weights on the forms supplied.

3. To deliver samples to the testing station, which is in the Jarvis Creamery and to secure return of box and empty bottles. Where members of the Cow Testing Association are patrons of the Jarvis Creamery, the delivery and return of box and bottles may be arranged with the cream drawers.

5. To agree to keep a record for the full year—lactation period—of every cow in the herd.

5. To pay a fee of 50c per cow per year.

The Department agrees to accept samples either from individual farmers or farmers organized in associations; to supply suitable accommodation and equipment, and test each sample for butter fat once each month.

Please note that the accommodation and equipment for the Cow Testing Association at Jarvis is being supplied free gratis by the Caledonia Dairy Company, Limited. The testing will be done by the staff of the Dairy Branch at the Jarvis Creamery.

Provision is being made for the issuing of a production certificate to any cow which reaches a satisfactory standard of production of milk and butter fat in 12 consecutive months, and to maintain the cow testing register for all cows which have qualified.

Only two Cow Testing Associations will be organized in Haldimand this (Continued on Page 5)

GOOD ATTENDANCE AT NANTICOKE CLUB MEETING

The Nanticoke True Canadian Club met in the town hall on Friday evening, April 9th, despite the bad roads with an attendance of fifty.

After a couple of hours of cards, Court Crier Allan Doughty called the Court to order with Judge John Vokes on the bench. C. Milton Henning and George E. Marshall pleaded "not guilty" to the offense charged against them, of stealing 25 sparrows from R. B. Hare on the night of February 12th, 1926, during a sparrow match. The case being a Crown one, came before His Worship Judge Vokes and jury. The plaintiff's cause was ably argued by prosecuting Crown Attorney J. L. Henning, while the defense was upheld by H. M. Pratten. The case was thoroughly fought and informed by several witnesses for both sides and was apparently a standstill when counsel for defence asked permission to search chest in hall where sparrows were said to be hidden on the 12th of Feb., and much to the surprise of the plaintiff, the paper sack containing the 25 sparrows were found. The birds showed every evidence of three months a corpse. Chairman Alma Vokes of the jury, after a thorough summing up of evidence and strenuous appeals from counsel and judge, for a true verdict, brought in a verdict of "Not Guilty."

Allan Doughty then favored the Club with the fortnightly paper, "The Eye-opener." President H. M. Pratten informed the Club that the Hon. John S.
