FEEDING NEW CHICKS

desert spoonfuls of fine chick feed, such as pinhead oatmeal and cracked corn each day, sprinkle in the litter that the chicks may exercise.

If milk is given to drink take 75 per cent. of the beef scrap out of the ration given. If milk and water are both given then reduce the beef scrap one half.

General Advice.

It is best to rear the chicks on new ground each year, and never to brood two lots of chicks on the same ground in any one year. Many chicks are sent in for examination each year that have troubles due to land infection.

Keep the feed boards clean, move them a little each day or better every feed, that the ground may be sweet and clean. Grit is always in easy access of the chicks. It is advisable and necessary to add a little oyster shell dust or fine particles to the ration daily. A certain amount of lime is necessary.

Mouldy feeds, dirty feed boards, and musty litter are to be avoided. Moulds kill large numbers of chicks.

As the chicks get older the number of feeds per day may be reduced, so that at an age of seven weeks three or four feeds per day are sufficient; in fact, after the second week hoppers of crushed oats or dry mash may be placed in the pen where the moist mash system is used. The feeds of moist mash being continued in what ever amount the chicks will clean up. — Poultry Dept., O. A. College.

Successful Brooding.

Successful brooding can be summed up under five headings:

1. Proper heat without drafts.
2. Careful and regular feeding, without sudden changes, ration to include milk in some form, and green stuff.
3. Avoid over feeding.
4. Get chicks on the ground and in the sun as soon as possible. Cut a sod and put it in the pen if the weather is cold and wet. Use a window in the brooder house that will permit the passage of ultra violet light rays (one of the glass cloth preparations).
5. Sanitary surroundings, clean dry litter. Clean water fountain, clean feed dishes.
6. When weather is cloudy or if rearing chicks very early in the season, add two per cent. Cod Liver Oil to the mash.

Here and There

The total coal production of Alberta mines during 1925 amounted to 5,883,394 tons, an increase of 679,681 tons over the preceding year. The figures were as follows: Domestic coal, 3,156,359 tons; sub-bituminous, 581,835; bituminous, 2,145,200.

A corps of young guides who will show visiting skiers the best locations, hills and runs for the sport was formed at Mont Roland, Que., in the Laurentian Mountains recently. About twenty young fellows were enrolled. For the summer a corps of guides will probably be formed to show visitors the best fishing, bathing and boating locations.

Twenty-three seconds was clipped off the Canadian record for women's indoor 220 yards swim at the Crystal Gardens, Victoria, B.C., when Marie-Chen Wenslaus, famous Hawaiian mermaid, Olympic champion and holder of 100 yard and 100 meter world records, met Audrey Griffin, well known Canadian girl swimmer of Vancouver. The time was 2.52 5-8.

The Chateau Frontenac at Quebec will have been reconstructed and the entire building of 190 rooms will have been rendered fire-proof by June 1st, according to information from head offices of the Canadian Pacific Railway in Montreal. The burnt part of the Chateau has been rebuilt up to the fourth floor while the steel for the roof is in process of erection.

Major F. J. Ney, executive secretary of the Canadian Council of Education, returned to Canada on board the Canadian Pacific liner Montcalm after a tour of Palestine, Cyprus and Egypt where he laid foundations for the organization of the Mediterranean branch of the Overseas Education League. Lord Lloyd, High Commissioner for Egypt and Field Marshall Lord Plumer, Commissioner in Palestine, have both consented to become honorary vice-presidents of the League.

When Lord and Lady Allenby were in Vancouver recently, a group of women whose husbands and sweethearts had been cared for by Lady Allenby during the war days in Cairo, thanked the "Lady of Mercy" for her care and attention. These husbands and sweethearts are now happily settled in the sunny Okanagan Valley of British Columbia and have banded in a unique organization known as the Jaffa Gate, every member, having passed through the Jaffa Gate into Jerusalem.
