LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The following communication has been received by The Jarvis Record and it is published with a view t clearing the aiar. If there s som misunderstanding relative to the at fairs of the Children's Aid Society as appears probable, from the im port of this letter, the officials of that institution, we believe, are quit capable of explaining the same:

LET THERE BE LIGHT

As one who has always been deer ly interested in welfare work, I woul like to draw attention to a publi question which has been agitating the minds of many for years-Th Haldimand Children's Aid Society.

For years past there has been a growing feeling that its management is altogether too much of a secret Nora M. Field society, the workings of which are religiously withheld from the paying public. To illustrate:

During the past year or so the paid official and chief executive (and spending official) of this society, for a long time, denied the County Council the right of scrutinizing the expenditures of the society. A more haughty, imperious and outrageous attitude would be hard to imagine. Here we find a paid official denying the elected representatives of the people, whose money is being spent, the right to know where and how.

And not alone has the expenditure of public money been concealed as much and as long as possible but other conditions of the work which would not bear the light of public opinion have been withheld or covered up, and even denied when coming to light. Not long ago, welfare worktrs of another organization found wards of the Haldimand Children's Aid Society in a home where immorality was very obvious.

And when a lone woman at the last meeting of the society attempted to bring this condition to light, she was pounced upon by members of the executive who attempted a whitewash. The Superintendent and Inspector falsified about the inmates of the home under discussion, and Col. Massie. Judge of the Juvenile Court came to the rescue and volunteered information as to the location of the home in question, stating that it was out-#de of the County of Haldimand, whereas the fact is that it is in Haldimand. A successful effort was made to squelch this lady and the matter she was pleading, but the statements made by both Mr. Bilger and Col. Massie were false. Both gave expression to statements which they knew to be false or stated as facts what they were not certain of. Whether falsehoods or deceptions the arguments suited the case by covering up an unsavory condition which should never have existed.

Another difficulty is that the meetings of this society have been "packed" against exposures being made. While many good and true welfare workers attend these meetings ready to see right and justice triumph, there are atways enough social, political, church and even blood friends of the powers-that-be ready to vete blindly for a continuance of past practices

Even the clergy have been either deceiving or being themselves deceived by those in power. To illustrate again: A year ago a well arranged plan increased the Inspector's salary by \$800. A clergyman eloquently, almost tearfully, appealed to Haldimand people to raise the pittance paid. It was male \$1000. This is in addition to travelling expenses, auto hire, rent, heat, light, telephone, etc. Did that clergyman know that the Inspector gets \$600 allowance and extra travelling expenses from the province in addition to the County payments? If fie knew it he was misleading his audience. If he didn't know it he was being mislead. Will he tell us?

This being a provincial-county organization as regards putting up the money should have a combined statement of receipts and expenses. The statements prepared by the secretary or inspector of his own doings and published and given to the county are only a part and are bound to lead to micenderstanding, and the inspector has no one but himself to blame if this misunderstanding beomes suspicion when he refused to give statements of funds handled by him Let there be light!

FIRE THREATENS OUR NATIONAL HERITAGE

Carelessness Destroys 3,000,000 acres annually of Canadian Forest

Loss of standing timber by fire continues to be appalling. On the average, over 3,500 million board feet are destroyed annually. The forests of Canada are being depleted at a rate they cannot possibly withstand; more than half of this depletion is due to fire, insects and decay. The future of the forest industry is just as dependent on the seedling trees and young growth as the pulp and paper and lumber mills, and industry generally, are dependent on mature timber - both must be saved from the ravages of fire.

In addition to the shelter afforded by the forest to the farmer and his stock, the settlers in forested regions are vitally dependent on the woods for winter employment. Care with fire in land-clearing operations is all-essential - burned timber pays no wages.

Canada has the finest inland fishing in the world, but these splendid food and game fish require clean, cold water in the streams to ensure prolific reproduction. Forest fires are inimical to fish life.

Game animals attract foreign tourists and induce Canadians to seek pleasure. health and adventure in the great outdoors. These animals are distinctly a forest resource — utterly dependent on it for protection and food. Forest fires are most destructive of such wild life.

Ninety per cent of the forest fires are caused by carelessness. Are you doing your part to prevent this wanton waste and destruction?
