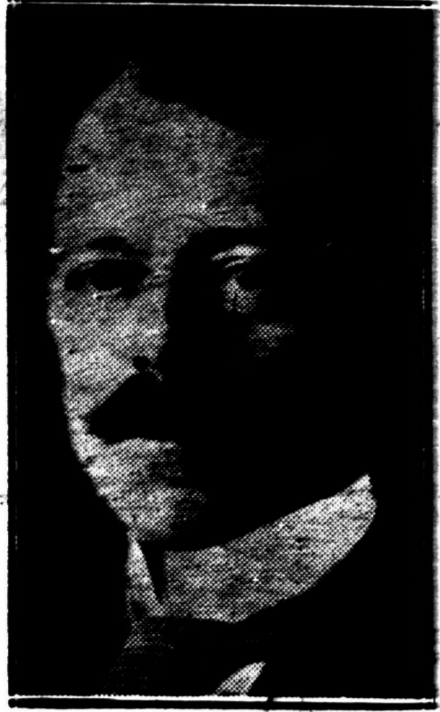

ELEVENTH SESSION COUNTY COUNCIL

5. Letter from Minister of Public Works acknowledging receipt of resolution requesting Province to take the river road over as provincial highway.
6. Letter from Clerk of the Township of Oneida requesting discharge of guns in the Township be prohibited.
7. Letter from Mothers' Allowance Commission enclosing list of beneficiaries.

Brown-McDonald—That we resume business with the warden in the chair. Carried.

Wingfield-Glenny—That the report of the Home Committee be received and read. Carried.

WILLIAM DOWNS

On Tuesday, October 9th, after a lingering illness of many months, Mr. William Downs passed away.

The late Mr. Downs was born 81 years ago, at Mount Healy where his father was sawyer at the lumber mills there. Leaving Mount Healy at an early age, he settled with the family in Walpole Township on the 8th Concession. Forty-five years ago he took the farm on the Stage Road, now occupied by Mr. Orloff Easton, and lived on it until his removal to Jarvis a few years ago. He leaves his widow, and one sister, Mrs. Joe Stadler, to mourn his passing.

Mr. Downs was a Presbyterian, being for many years a supporter of Chalmers Church, Walpole, and later of Knox Church, Jarvis. In politics he was a staunch Liberal, the last Dominion election being the only election he did not cast a vote in, since he was able to exercise the franchise.

The funeral, which was largely attended, took place on Friday, October 12th, from his home in town to Chalmers Cemetery, Walpole. The services were conducted by Rev. W. T. Brown, and the following acted as pall-bearers: James Falls, Robert Laidlaw, H. Fleming, R. A. McCarter, Geo. Webb and Peter Banks.
