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## RETIREES FROM BANK SERVICE

**Mr. S. Craig Evans Will Devote Entire Time to Manufacturing Business**

Mr. S. Craig Evans, who since the dissolution of the Union Bank has been associated with Mr. R. L. Torrance in the management of the Royal Bank, has severed his connection with the latter institution, and will devote his time to the operation of the Royal Knitting Company, Limited.

Mr. Evans, who has been in the banking profession for quite a number of years, came to Guelph from Hagersville in May, 1919, to assume the duties of manager in the local branch of the Union Bank, a position in which he became well known and highly popular. In 1923 he purchased the Royal Knitting Company, Limited, from Mr. Sam Carter, but until now has not taken an active interest in the operation of the concern. However, he finds that the increasing volume of business makes it necessary for him to devote his time to the management of his own company.

Mr. Gordon Grierson, who has held the post of manager and secretary of the company, will be retained in the same capacity.

During the time that Mr. Evans has been associated with the two local banks, his courtesy and tact have earned for him the high esteem of the customers, who will learn with regret that he is leaving the service. During Mr. Torrance's four months' absence abroad this year, Mr. Evans conducted the business of the branch of the Royal Bank.

## SENTENCED AT HAGERSVILLE

HAGERSVILLE, Ont., Dec. 14.—Joseph Krulicki, of 265 Barton street west, Hamilton, and Howard Smith, no address, were sentenced each to a term of three to six months in the Ontario reformatory by Magistrate Massie in police court here today. The men were arrested following an attempt to rob Cairn's General Store in that town, and suspected or being the parties connected with an attempt to enter E. T. Carter's store in Jarvis. The charges of theft against the pair were dropped, but they were sentenced as vagrants. Both men had been previously convicted.

## SURROGATE COURT

At a Sittings of the Surrogate Court at Cayuga on Friday, the 3rd inst. an action was tried before His Honor Judge Hopkins in which the validity of the will of William Duxbury, a retired farmer, late of Hagersville, deceased, was in question. The deceased was 95 years of age at the time of his death, in December, 1925, and the will was drawn by Mr. S. E. Lindsay on the 15th of August, 1925, in which Roy T. Hewitt, a grandson, and George Duxbury, a son, were named as Executors. The will was supported by Roy T. Hewitt, a grandson and by Albert H. Duxbury, and son and one of the devisees named in the will and it was attacked by George W. Duxbury, the other son of the deceased, who was also named as Executor in the will, on the ground of want of testamentary capacity and undue influence. Evidence was given by S. E. Lindsay, who drew it and was a witness to it, Dr. McCracken, the medical advisor of the deceased and the other witness to the will, the Rev. Mr. Brearly, the spiritual advisor of the deceased and by a son and daughter. His Honor stated that the evidence was so strong that the testator had a clear mind, although his sight and hearing were impaired, that he suggested the executors get together and try to settle the matter. Acting on the Judge's suggestion they did so and it was agreed that the will be admitted to probate and that George W. Duxbury should renounce his right to probate and that the costs be paid out of the estate.
