UNIFORM RATE FOR NATURAL GAS

The application of the Dominion Natural Gas Company for increased rates was heard at Brantford and Hagersville, Tuesday and Wednesday of last week. Court sat until 10 o'clock each evening. The following municipalities were affected by this application: Dunnville, Simcoe, Cayuga, Hagersville, Jarvis, Port Dover, Port Rowan, St. Williams, Delhi, Port Huron and Vienna; the Townships of Malahide and Bayham in the County of Hantsburg; Middlesex, North Wellington, South Wellington, Chatham, Windham, Woodstock and Westmore in the County of Kent; Walsby, Rainham, So. Rainham, North Cayuga, Dunn, Hamilton, Camhoro, Onondaga and Seneca in the County of Hamilton; Barton, Braham and Glanford, in the County of Westworth, and the Township of Colston in the County of Lincoln.

The Company in their application and in their material filed and evidence given contended that they required a rate of \$1.09 per thousand cubic feet in order to pay a fair dividend and to make a return to the stockholders of the money invested. They contended that the gas in these municipalities would be exhausted in 17 years more so far as operating at any profit. They contended if there was any gas left in 1943 that it would not be more than pay operating expenses.

The municipalities interested had R. O. Yenne-Roberts, an expert engineer, and H. M. Boddy, an expert accountant, give evidence to the effect that the Company could pay a dividend of 8% and make a return to the stockholders of the money invested if they received 45c or 50c per thousand. The Referee held, however, that a person investing money in an investment such as a gas company which is more or less speculative, should receive a dividend of more than 8%, otherwise, it would not attract many to this investment and it would not encourage the drilling of wells.

After all the evidence had been heard the Referee fixed the price to be paid at 60c per thousand cubic feet. At the request of the Company afterwards he changed this so that the order will provide that 65c per thousand cubic feet is to be paid and that the rates are rendered will be reduced by amount of 5% per thousand.

W. N. Tilley, K.C., and C.F.H. Pearson, of Toronto, and Edmund Sweet of Brantford appeared for the applicants.

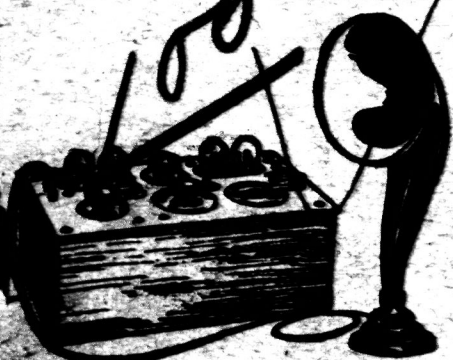

SIMCOE STORE JOINS BUYING FEDERATION

The following paragraph of interest to Jarvis people appeared in recent issues of Toronto daily papers:

"With a view to effecting large savings through purchasing their goods as one unit, a federation comprising upwards of twenty-five large department stores in Ontario has been formed. The stores in question are declared to have had a combined turnover last year of \$10,000,000. Purchasing offices will be maintained in such world centres as London, Paris, New and other places at a fraction of what it would cost any single member for the same service. The aim of the federation is to buy economically. Each store, however will operate as a separate entity. No more important change has taken place in the Canadian dry goods field for a number of years than the formation of Federated Distributors, Limited, a buying group of some 25 to 30 stores, with head offices in Toronto. Each store, however, is a splendid independent business, able, willing and anxious to pay cash for their purchases—when savings can be made—and will continue to conduct their respective stores as the separate institutions they are; but they will develop economies in the cities in which their members' stores are located, first, by exchanging information and ideas, and secondly by purchasing merchandise and supplies in bulk direct from the factories, and so effect savings that will result in generous money-saving opportunities for the shopping public."

"Department stores interested in the new buying group are located in Hamilton, Chatham, Brockville, Brantford, St. Thomas, Simcoe, St. Catharines, Fort William, Belleville and other places.

"While this is the first federation of this kind in Canada, several organizations of a similar nature are functioning with great success, and include the largest stores in the most important centres in the United States."
