Amid scenes of the wildest excitement, the government at 1 o'clock last Friday morning, secured a majority of three on the non-confidence amendment proposition by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader. Five Progressives voted with the Conservatives. The total vote stood: Against 123, for 120. Majority against three.


