HEAVY FIRE LOSSES FLORIDA SPECULATION GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED U.S. RAP RUBBER MONOPOLY

Amid scenes of the wildest excitement, the government at 1 o'clock last Friday morning, secured a majority of three on the non-confidence amendment proposition by Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighan, Conservative leader. Five Progressives voted with the Conservatives. The total vote stood: Against 123, for 120. Majority against three.

As the figures were announced by the clerk, both Liberals and Conservatives rose, cheering frantically, flinging masses of paper in the air in their excitement. Up to date, the naval debate in 1913 was the high level of Canadian parliamentary thrill. Ottawa observers, whose memory goes back 30 or 40 years, declare that never was there such public interest in any parliamentary tilt.

The French members, before the vote, chanted *Alouette*, a song which in English is: "We reap in joy what we sow in pain." The result proved them right. As the Progressives rose, each was watched with intense interest. Something like a groan came from the Liberals as the five prairie bolters voted Tory. Agnes MacPhail voted Liberal. The five Progressives who voted Conservative were: M. N. Campbell, W. T. Lucas, A. M. Carmichael, A. M. Boutillier, and W. R. Fansher. There were only two votes not cast out of a possible 245.

The Fifteenth Parliament of Canada was in session six days, and the vast majority of Canadians, irrespective of party or group allegiance, have had enough of it. Premier King will reorganize now, but as soon as the voting of supply and the transaction of necessary business is concluded, the people are prepared to face the inconvenience and cost of another election in the hope of securing stable government, and a Commons which is prepared to devote its energies to the service of the country.

The six days of political jockeying, wire-pulling, sidestepping, manipulating and intrigue are more than sufficient. The sordid spectacle of the representatives of two historic parties, eager to banter their professed principles and policies for office, has sickened the public.

Canada has had enough. Better put up with another election, get back to two party system, and secure a good government once more. It may not be all it should be. But it will be better than this.

Fire last week destroyed the White House Inn, on the Geolph highway, valued at around \$7,000.

Twenty bedridden patients, including two babies, were carried to safety, when the Victoria Public Hospital, of Renfrew, was practically destroyed by fire, with a loss of over \$35,000, last week.

Tillsonburg suffered the first fire fatality last week, since the disastrous Queen's Hotel fire in 1901. The boarding house of Mrs. E. Jones was destroyed, one daughter, aged 17, perished in the flames, and others suffered injuries.

Government red tape has outdone itself down in Woodstock. The city wanted to light up the war memorial. To do this they found it necessary to put a screw-eye in the wall of the Armories. But permission to put the screw-eye in the wall had to be received from the military authorities. With considerable pomposity the city was "granted the privilege of defacing the Armories to the extent of inserting one screw-eye in the wall." Then to cap the whole farce a bulky document from Ottawa arrived to say that 25 cents a year rental would be charged for the space. This is the sort of poppy-cock to which the taxpayers' good money is spent on. (Continued on Page 5)

Frank D. Ungaro, barrister, was sentenced by Judge Coatsworth in Toronto Police Court to one year in the Ontario Reformatory, and one year indeterminate for the theft of client's moneys amounting to \$4,315.50.
