JUDGMENT GIVEN ON SANDUSK BRIDGE

His Honor Judge Hopkins has given judgment on the application of the Township of Walpole to have the bridge over Sandusk Creek taken over by the County. He has dismissed the application and although he holds the bridge is over 300 feet in length, he holds that it does not comply with the other conditions which are necessary in order that he should declare it to be a county bridge.

Section 449 of the Municipal Act provides:

"A bridge of a greater length than 300 feet in a town having an equalized assessment of less than \$1,000,000 or in a township may, on the application of the Council of such town or township, be declared to be a County bridge, where

(a) It is used by the inhabitants of other municipalities;

(b) It is situated on an important highway affording means of communication to several municipalities; and

(c) On account of its length, and for the reasons mentioned in clauses (a) and (b), it is unjust that the burden of maintaining and repairing it should rest upon the corporation of the town or township."

This bridge is situated about 250 yds. from Lake Erie, and leads to two small summer resorts, Woodlawn Park at the end of the road where there are 21 cottages and to Peacock Point about one mile west of Woodlawn Park where there are about 35 cottages. The parties occupying the cottages have their permanent residences in Hamilton, Brantford and other places. The Judge held, however, that for the purpose of this Act, the parties occupying these cottages are inhabitants of the Township of Walpole and he further finds that on the evidence there is not a steady and continual travel by any but inhabitants of the Township of Walpole over this bridge and that the bridge does not comply with either sub-section (a) or (b) of Section 449.

This is an important decision at the present time for both the Township and the County, as a bridge will be required over this creek which is estimated will cost about \$18,000.

NANTICOKE HOLDS POSITION AT HEAD OF THE LEAGUE

In by far the closest battles of the Haldimand County League games of this season, Nanticoke defeated Fisherville 9-11 in a 10-inning game at Nanticoke on June 24th.

The game almost promised a winner for the visitors until the ninth, when Nanticoke tied an 8 score of their opponents. Fisherville took the lead from the beginning, scoring 2 each in the 2nd, 5th and 6th and 1 each in the 3rd, 9th and 10th. Nanticoke did not score until the 5th, when they scored 2, adding 2 in the 6th and 4 in the 9th, and tying the score again early in the 10th, and after considerable battling Ineson knocked a 2-bagger with full bases which won with a majority of 2.
