## BUSINESS COLLEGE MERGER

On June 26th, 1926, at Waterford, was consummated the amalgamation of the Robinson Business College, Limited (operating schools at Waterford, Brantford, Norwich and Dunnville), and the Simcoe Business College, the new organization to carry on business under the name of the Robinson Business College, Limited, with J. H. Bowden, Principal at Simcoe, as President; O. U. Robinson, Principal at Waterford, as Secretary-Treasurer, and W. A. Robinson, Principal at Brantford, as Vice-President. The other members of the Board of Directors are: W. M. Hilliard, of Simcoe; L. A. Youmans, of Tillsonburg, and P. M. Button, of Oakland.

The new interests have purchased from Carlton Wells the equipment and goodwill of the Tillsonburg Business College and will conduct it as a Robinson school under the able direction of Mr. L. A. Youmans as Principal.

For several years these two organizations, in close proximity, have grown from small private classes to large and flourishing colleges. The heads of these two institutions, Mr. O. U. Robinson and Mr. J. H. Bowden, while they have been competitors for 12 years, have always played the game fairly, and have retained their friendship. Sensibly, they have formed a basis of union, and from this time forward the two organizations will work together, in the firm belief that Commercial Education can be brought to a still higher plane.

When two such institutions as these—noted not only locally but throughout all Ontario, for carry on, from year to year, a high grade of work—combine their efforts, it seems reasonable to believe that they will be able to place Business Education before the residents of these Southern Counties in a much more emphatic manner as heretofore.

To the Waterford motto, "Above the Average," and the Simcoe slogan, "An Ambitious School for Ambitious Students," will be added, "The Student First, Last, and Always." These people in the amalgamation served by these schools can save them with their patronage with increasing confidence that the Robinson Schools stand for Superiority.
