## BONNETT-MEEHAN

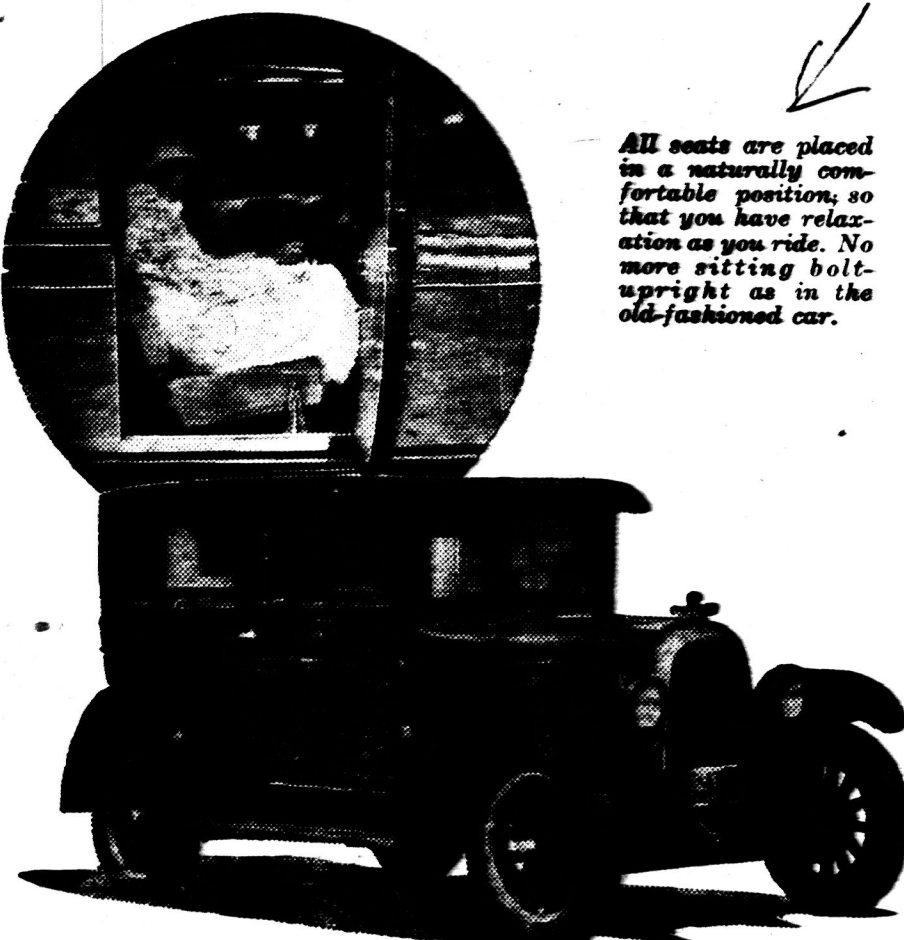

## HON. J. S. MARTIN ADDRESSES W. I.

The Women's Institute of Haldimand held their annual convention in the Presbyterian church, Jarvis, on Thursday, July 8th. By many it was judged the best held in the annals of the county.

The morning session opened at 10 o'clock with the President, Mrs. Peart, in the chair. After singing of the Institute Ode, Rev. Mr. Brown offered prayer. Mrs. T. Guiler welcomed the delegates and Mrs. J. F. Culver of Selkirk replied, paying a feeling tribute to the late Mrs. Lamb, for many years president of the Selkirk branch and first vice-president of the County. The president gave a brief address on aims and achievements of W. I., placing forward that the present was a testing time in Canada and urging the members to meet the call.

The Secretary reported splendid county meetings held at Canfield, Neles Corners and Cayuga. The conference of branch officers being especially successful at their initial meeting and will be held again in September in Caledonia. Next year, the 25th anniversary of organization in Haldimand, a reunion of workers, old and new, will be held in Cayuga at the District Annual.

Mrs. Berry, Payne and McCarter reported on Extension work, three new branches being formed during the past year and others in prospect.

Reports from 20 branches told of activities in improvement of schools through Home and School Committees, school lunches provided, assistance at school fairs, showcases provided for fall fairs, sidewalks built, cemeteries beautified, community halls established, flowers planted in public squares, immigrants assisted, hospitals and blind assisted, social evenings and much other work. In fact, whatever the W. I. has found at hand to do, they have accomplished it.

C. R. Bilger brought greetings from the Children's Aid Society and asked the continued interest of W. I. in this work.

The afternoon session was opened with community singing, led by Mrs. H. J. Hoshal of Cayuga.

The reports of conveners of standing committees proved quite interesting.

Mrs. S. S. Moote, on "Health," placed the great usefulness of the Health Almanac, which can be obtained for the asking from the Department of Health, and told of many other free aids which are placed within our reach by the same Department.

Mrs. D. Z. Gibson, on "Agriculture," spoke of the great work that might be done in beautifying our homes with trees, shrubs and flowers. She referred briefly to egg and cream grading and told of the surface charge on hydro which is a burden to rural users that city consumers are not required to bear.

Mrs. W. S. Dunnet, on "Immigration," told of the increased number of foreigners in our county, what had been done and what still might be done to make them good Canadian citizens.

Miss Macniven, on "Publicity," said it was up to each branch to do its best and she would do all in her power to make it public.

Mrs. J. Doyle, on "Home Economics," said the W. I. was the great source through which the practical housekeeper gets her inspiration and suggested a hint box at each meeting on work connected with the home.
