London.—The five weeks' old daughter of the Duke and Duchess of York, the third in line of succession to the British throne, was christened Elizabeth Alexandra Mary in the private chapel at Buckingham Palace on May 29th. She is the first royal baby to be baptized in that chapel.

The ceremony was private and hardly a score of persons, including, of course, the godparents, King George, Queen Mary, the Prince of Wales and Lady Elphinstone, sister of the Duchess of York, were present.

At the christening the infant wore a robe of old lace several feet long, which was worn by the King and the Prince of Wales when they were baptized.
