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ARRESTED FOR STEALING DRUGS

Ernest Morton, of Hamilton, was placed under arrest on Wednesday about noon for stealing a quantity of morphia tablets from the office of Dr. Leatherdale.

The young man entered the doctor's office, where he was met by Mr. Mitchell, and requested to see the doctor. Learning that the doctor was out, stated he would wait if Mitchell would go out to locate him. During the latter's absence, Morton took the bottles containing morphia tablets and left the office. When Dr. Leatherdale arrived at the office the young man was missing and the doctor noticed also that the bottles containing his morphia tablets were missing. An immediate search was made for the stranger, who was found sitting on the rear of the Simcoe truck which was about to leave. He was placed under arrest and searched, but the missing drugs were not found on his person. He denied the offense, and also that he had been in the doctor's office. He was taken back to the office, where Mr. Mitchell identified him. A search was then made of the truck and the bottles containing the missing drugs were found hidden among the boxes, where he had placed them. He then admitted his guilt and was sent down to Cayuga to await trial.

DEATHS

On the 20th of May, 1926, Mrs. Eliza Boulbee, eldest sister of Mr. C. E. Bourne, Jarvis, passed away at her home in Vancouver, B.C., in her 90th year. Mrs. Boulbee formerly lived in Walpole at Nanticoke. She was married at Port Stanley to Washington Boulbee, who lived near Rymal.

Mr. C. E. Bourne has received word of the death of his brother, George W. Bourne, who died on Monday, June 7th. Deceased was in his 82nd year, and in his youth was for some years a resident of Walpole, near Nanticoke, afterwards removing to Manitoba. He married Miss Catherine Gamble at Port Dover, who, with one son and one daughter survive him.

Dear Editor:—
The season is rapidly passing and as one who attends and is interested in the Jarvis Fall Fair, I would like to offer a kindly suggestion to the Directors.

Being a friend of good horses, I must confess I cannot enjoy or uphold the Drawing Contest phase of the program.

After spending a short time last year looking at this part of the bill of fare, I turned away from it feeling that it was a cruel piece of rivalry. When I saw those splendid teams of horses, standing nervous and trembling, then straining every nerve and muscle in their body, I felt it was nothing less than downright cruelty to dumb animals.

I have spoken to several men since then, who have good teams of horses, and they declare they would not put their horses into that contest for ten times the value of the prize offered. It is bound to injure those splendid horses more or less and some of them permanently.

That part of the program might be substituted by a men's tug of war teams, the Village against the township or different parts of the township might compete. This tug of war game by men is very popular and interesting. But don't ruin those splendid horses for a little paltry applause.

BY ORDER OF COUNCIL.

TWO-CENT LETTER RATE JULY FIRST

Reduction in letter rates of postage from 3 to 2 cents, as announced in the federal budget, goes into effect on July 1st. In this connection the post office department announces that on and after that date the rate of postage on letters for Canada, the United States, Mexico and all other places in the North American continent will be 2 cents for each ounce or fraction thereof.

The 2-cent letter rate will apply on letters posted in Canada addressed to: Canada—for local delivery and to all places within the Dominion; the U.S., Newfoundland, Mexico, British West Indies (Bermuda, St. Kitts, Antigua, Montserrat, Dominica, St. Lucia, Barbados, Bahamas, Jamaica, British Guiana, British Honduras), Costa Rica, Cuba, Dominican Republic, Dutch West Indies (Aruba, Bonaire, Curacao, Saba, St. Eustatius, St. Martin), French West Indies (Martinique, Guadeloupe), Guatemala, Panama Republic, Salvador, St. Pierre and Miquelon.
