### WHAT IS PROFIT?

"If a merchant buys flour at \$4.00 a barrel and sells it \$5.00, how much profit does he make? (Answer, \$1.00) If a boy buys a pig for \$2.00, keeps it for six months and sells it for \$7.00, how much profit does he make? (Answer, \$5.00)"

We remember from childhood a string of problems like that. They may have taught us good arithmetic, but they also taught us some bad economics. For they took the entire margin as "profit," making no account of the cost of handling the flour or feeding the pig. Those of us who grew up and went into business had to learn by hard experience that there is no profit until we have paid rent, salaries, taxes, insurance and a dozen other costs.

It would be a good move if the different organizations associated with the Graphic Arts trades were to approach the publishers of arithmetic school books suggesting the revision of examples now in use. The fact should be made clear that the margin includes both expense and profit and new problems which will get the student used to figuring the costs of doing business should be incorporated. With a generation schooled in those facts perhaps there will not be so many distressing failures among the storekeepers. And perhaps consumers will be more just and more intelligent in their criticism of merchants.—Printing Review.

But then, his talk about a mechanical cow didn't amount to much.

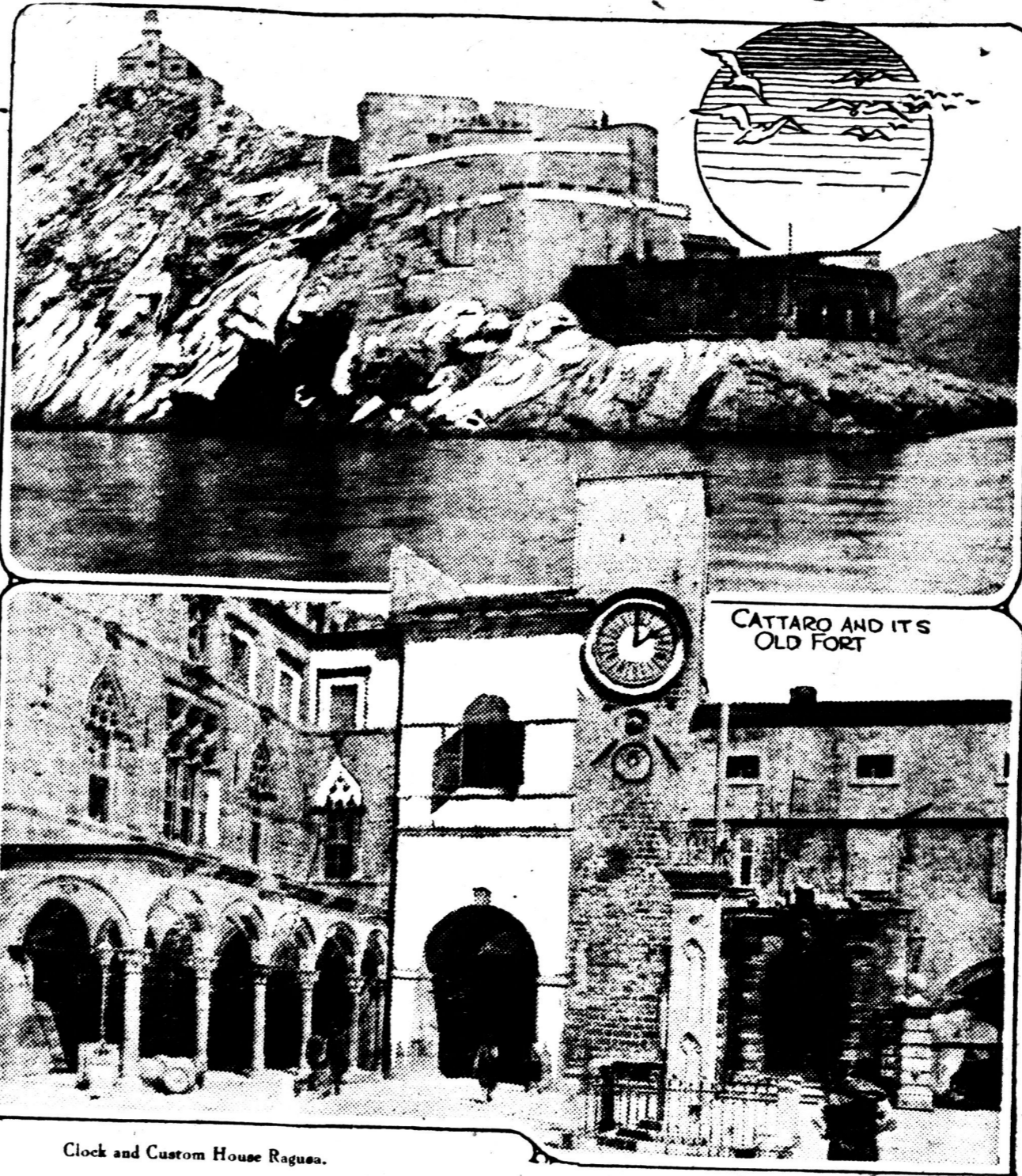
The boss says the International Live Stock Show takes the conceit out of a lot of folks.

## Pigeons Were Postmen in Old Ragusa



Clock and Custom House Ragusa.

Seven hundred years ago, the Pigeons of the Free City of Ragusa, in Dalmatia, were postmen. They went across all the seas in boats, travelled with all the caravans, and knew all the routes of the air which brought them back to Ragusa. Like the sailors of Ragusa, they were known in all the ports of the world as a protection, they were made citizens of the Free City of Ragusa. Any person molesting or insulting a pigeon was therefore guilty of offense against the state, and was brought before the tribunal. Homes were built for these pigeons in the city walls, and the streets and roof tops were theirs. Every man who entered at the city gates was

obliged to offer as tribute from his native town two pigeons. These lived in wooden cages labeled with the names of their homes, and gossiped with the other pigeons until their turn came to carry out a letter. In this way, Ragusa enlarged its postal system. But the centuries rolled by, Ragusa lost its freedom. Venice usurped its powers on the sea. Battleships steamed up and down the Adriatic with the other citizens, the pigeons lost their rights and were forced to associate with the sea gulls from Lacroma, an island to the north, sometimes suffering the indignity of begging grain from the birds with whom in the days of their exclusive

splendour, they would not associate. Today, the port of Gravosa, Ragusa's harbor, is crowded with ships bearing the new flag of Jugo-Slavia. Passengers from the Empress of France, the Canadian Pacific steamship which next year will add Cattaro and Gravosa ports on its annual Mediterranean cruise, will have a chance to scatter crumbs to the thousands of cooing pigeons still crowding Ragusa's streets, and adding to its beauty. The white city, "Bride of the Sea," some poet has called her, would be less beautiful if the iridescent necks of the pigeons did not make small splashes of color on the spotless smooth marbles and the gray white buildings.

One night five cars with American licenses speeded past the customs officer at Queenstown, and the night previous two powerful cars were chased into the open country, after attempting the same experiment.

Hearing of the application of the Bell Telephone Co. for increased rates on exchange service in Ontario and Quebec has been adjourned until April 19th.

Fully half a mile in length, a special train of 64 cars carrying the largest shipment of motor cars ever carried in one train through Canada; left the C.N.R. siding of the Ford Motor Co., Ford Ont., last week for the Pacific Coast. The train was loaded to capacity with some 300 Ford cars, valued around \$200,000.

Taken to Philadelphia from Detroit, on physician's advice, a 22-months-old child was pronounced on the road to recovery in the bronchoscopic clinic of a hospital at Philadelphia, after physicians succeeded in removing a wooden bead from her lung. The child was playing with a string of beads and placed them in her mouth. A moment later the string broke and the little girl, coughing violently, dislodged two beads which had slipped in the windpipe. A third bead lodged in her lung.
