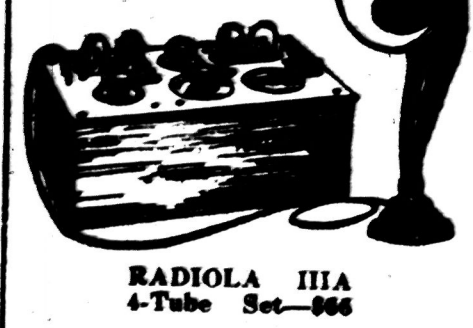

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## TIMELY TOPICS

From Near and Far, outside our own Community, condensed to make clear and quick reading possible

That one thousand immigrant boys will be required in Oxford and adjoining countries this year to supply the demand which has come in from the farmers of the district, was the statement made by Adit. Leech, supt. of the Woodstock immigration lodge of the Salvation Army.

Thieves continue their depredations in Wainfleet Township. Near the scene of the Palmer shooting, the garage of R. Dean, in Marshville, was robbed last week, and tires and accessories stolen, to the value of \$500.

Search for the five bodies of the Phibbs family, held beneath the ice of Lake Erie, was definitely abandoned Wednesday. No further effective measures for their discovery can be taken until the lake is clear of ice. The ice is now too treacherous to be ventured on. It was planned at one time to use electrical magnetic devices, but this has been dropped, because of the belief that electricity would not be effective through the ice. Mr. Charles Neale of West Lorne, noted exponent of the "diving rod" left for home last week, after spending four unsuccessful days in the search for the bodies.

Mayor Parker, of Woodstock, announced last week that he intends to put before the City Council a proposal that Woodstock should follow the lead of Owen Sound in giving free lots to citizens who will build homes on them. The city owns a number of these lots seized for non-payment of taxes. This is a splendid idea and it is to be hoped that other towns will follow Owen Sound's example.

Robert James Hunter, a motorman in the employ of the Hamilton Street Railway, who collapsed at his post, while driving a belt line car, Monday morning, died in the General hospital at an early hour the following morning. He was born at Jarvis 60 years ago, and had resided in Hamilton for the last 22 years, during which time he was in the service of the Street Railway company. Deceased was a member of the Street Railway union.

Surviving, besides his wife, are: one son, Clifford L., of Panama city; three daughters, Mrs. Wm. Alger, of Pittsburg; Mrs. Chas. Stipe, of Hamilton, and Miss Viola, at home; two brothers, Wm. Hunter, of Detroit, and Samuel, of San Francisco, and two sisters, Mrs. Martha Clark, of Hamilton, and Mrs. Margaret Glass, of Waterdown.

The funeral will take place on Thursday (today) afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, from his late residence, 15 Avalon place, to Hamilton cemetery. Deceased was a brother-in-law of D. M. Allen.
