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GO TO SUNDAY SCHOOL SUNDAY

Is sufficient attention being given to the religious training and development of the children and youth of today? Are parents guiding their children aright, or are they shirking their duty? If they are shirking, why is it? Is home life ideal? Are parents trying to save themselves trouble and responsibility?

The establishment of a home brings with it a great responsibility to parents and to their children, to the world around them and to future generations. Schools, Churches, Sunday Schools and society cannot take the place of the home or assume the parents' duties, but they should be allies of the home in securing a better citizenship and in producing a higher type of moral character.

To give prominence to these questions so that they may receive more careful consideration than is now being given, a day has been set apart throughout the Dominion to be observed on Go-to-Sunday-School Sunday. It has been felt that in the Sunday School we have an institution working definitely and effectively for the development of moral character and the training of Christian citizenship, and it should have the whole-hearted co-operation of every parent and every home. An effort is being made on this day, Sunday, May 9th, to secure a greatly increased attendance at the Sunday School and to enroll a membership which has as its ideal every last member of the community.

During the preceding week, May 2 to 9th, special attention is drawn to the religious welfare of little children by the observance of Children's Week, and in this way by visitation of the homes, a Children's Story and Play Hour, and a Parent-Teachers' Meeting, the homes and the Sunday School, are brought into closer co-operation.

As the observance of Go-to-Sunday-School Sunday, with Mothers' Day, a special program for use in the Sunday School and Church Service has been prepared, and is issued by charge by the Ontario Religious Education Council, to all co-operating Sunday Schools. While it is deemed worthy and admirable to pay our tribute to the memory of the mothers who have passed away, it is surely desirable that attention be devoted to the mothers of the present and the future, for upon them depends in a large measure the character of the citizenship of to-morrow.

Every local citizen should seriously ask himself whether he does not owe it to his country, his community, his church and himself to give his support, both morally and financially to the observance of Go to Sunday School Day, May 9th, and in this way help to make the Sunday School a strong factor in the building up of a better home life, in creating a higher Canadian citizenship.

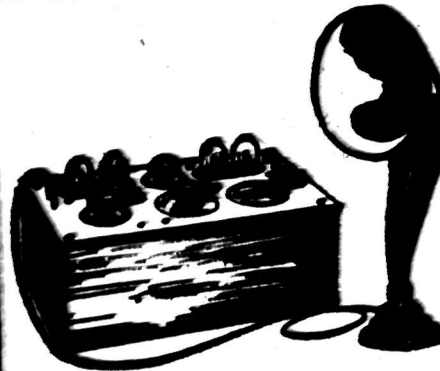
Remember the date: May 9th, and let every one—young and old—pay a loyal tribute on that date.

OBJECTS

The objects of a Bacon Hog Fair are as follows:

1. To encourage farmers to take more interest in producing the type of hogs known as "selects."

2. To produce bacon hogs on a community basis.

3. To market the hogs at the proper time for best results.

Select bacon hogs, marketed in uniform volume throughout the year, will build up the export bacon trade and return more money to the Canadian farmer.

For the purpose of conducting the fair, donations will be granted from the Dominion Live Stock Branch, \$100.00; the Ontario Live Stock Branch, \$100.00; locally, from \$100 to \$150.

This fair is yours; take an interest in it. Come to the organization meeting and assist in putting over a successful Bacon Hog Fair in Haldimand County.

It might be of interest for you to know that the Western part of Haldimand County and the Eastern part of Norfolk have made the greatest progress in the increased number of select bacon hogs since hog grading has been established. FIELD CROP COMPETITION

The Jarvis Agricultural Society have decided to hold a Standing Field Crop Competition for the year 1926 in the crops of Oats and Fall Wheat. In order to encourage the selection of the best varieties of grains, the Dept. of Agriculture has decided that competitors should select from the following:

Fall Wheat — "Dawson's Golden Chaff," Imperial Amber and O.A.C.

Oats — Banner; O.A.C. No. 72; Alaska; Abundance; Yellow Russian; Gold Rain and O.A.C. No. 3.

This does not prohibit the use of any other variety than those named, but when the judge is scoring a field, if any other variety than the above named Standard ones is grown, two points will be deducted from the total score.

The only qualification necessary to make entrance is that the exhibitor become a member of the Society which costs \$1.00, giving all the other privileges of the Society as well, and \$1.00 entry fee for each crop. Entries may be made to the Secretary, Geo. L. Miller, at any time before June 1st, 1926.
