## WOOL SHIPPING

Sheepowners throughout the County of Haldimand will again be able to conveniently load their wool clips at certain local points for shipment to their own warehouse at Weston, Ontario for grading and sale. This is a service that was first started in 1923 and since that time it has been eminently successful with an increasing number of shipments each year. The main idea is to collect if possible, sufficient wool at any one point to make up a sizable shipment and secure a lower freight rate. It serves, also, as a convenience to shippers, but does not in any way, signify that individual shipments cannot be made at any time in the usual way.

This year the Loading Days are as follows:

Dunnville—Tuesday, May 25th  
Hagersville—Wed. a.m., May 26  
Caledonia—Wed. p.m., May 26  
Cayuga—Thursday a.m., May 27  
Jarvis—Thursday p.m., May 27

A man will be on hand at each point to receive the different farm clips as they are brought in, stencils the sacks and see that the car is properly packed and shipped.

Owing to the late season, these loading days may seem a trifle early, but it is urged that sheepmen shear their sheep during the next few days and bring in their wool to the nearest of these loading points on the day specified. Wool sacks and paper twine are obtainable as usual from Cayuga.

Inmates 30, females 12, males 18. Health same as usual. There were 2 deaths during the month. Friends buried the remains of Mr. Hartzel and Mrs. Humphrey. The inmates of the Home were again treated to a very pleasant evening by Emerald Lodge I.O.O.F. A splendid program was provided by the members including music by Voll's Novelty Orchestra which was an unusual treat for the old people. The usual gifts were given to the inmates and Bro. Hastings, on behalf of the lodge, presented the Manager, Mr. Brown, and the Matron, Mrs. Gardener, with suitable tokens. The Home Committee wish to thank the citizens of Dunnville, especially the employees of the Monarch Knitting Co. for the splendid gift of a radio for the inmates, and much credit is due Dr. McMurtry for his activities in bringing this wonderful invention to the old people in their lonely hours.

6. That the Trustees of the Police Village of Fisherville be given permission to erect a silent policeman provided it is properly erected and a red light kept on the same at night.
