To Be Held at Dunnville, Nov. 30th, 1926, to Feb. 25th, 1927, in Town Hall and the High School

We take pleasure in announcing another three months' course in Agri- on Monday. culture and Home economics,, under the management of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, for the County of Haldimand. The courses will be held in Dunnville, Nov. 30th, 1920 to Feb. 25th, 1927. Agriculture in the Town Hall and Home Economics in the High School.

The object of the course is to give an education to the young men and young women who have not had an opportunity to attend colleges. It is a practical course, and compares favorably with the first year at the Ontario Agricultural College and Macdonald Institute. Plan to take the course. It may mean some sacrifice of time, but we feel that it will pay large dividends later on.

The course will be held every week day except Saturday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Christmas vacation will be from December 18th to January 2nd, inclusive. The contingency fee for each student is 50 cents per month, to cover unforseen expenses during the course.

Prizes for attendance, general proficiency, etc., will be announced during the course. Literary meetings and Tuesday. social gatherings will be promoted at opportune times.
