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SCHOOL ELEMENTARY AGRICULTURE: HOME ECONOMICS

To Be Held at Dunnville, Nov. 30th, 1926, to Feb. 25th, 1927, in Town Hall and the High School

We take pleasure in announcing another three months' course in Agriculture and Home Economics, under the management of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, for the County of Haldimand. The courses will be held in Dunnville, Nov. 30th, 1926, to Feb. 25th, 1927. Agriculture in the Town Hall and Home Economics in the High School.

The object of the course is to give an education to the young men and women who have not had an opportunity to attend colleges. It is a practical course, and compares favorably with the first year at the Ontario Agricultural College and Macdonald Institute. Plan to take the course. It may mean some sacrifice of time, but we feel that it will pay large dividends later on.

The course will be held every week day except Saturday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Christmas vacation will be from December 18th to January 2nd, inclusive. The contingency fee for each student is 50 cents per month, to cover unforeseen expenses during the course.

Prizes for attendance, general proficiency, etc., will be announced during the course. Literary meetings and social gatherings will be promoted at opportune times.

The admission is free. No text books to buy. No examinations to write. Decide to take the course, and send your name to the Agricultural Office at Cayuga.

VETERINARIAN VICTIM OF ALCOHOL POISONING

SIMCOE, Nov. 5.—Cecil Fairchild, of Silverhill, aged 28, who practiced as a veterinary surgeon over a wide district in Central Norfolk, died of alcohol poisoning at 8 o'clock this morning, despite the efforts of Dr. Nicholson, of Langton, to clear his system of the effects of the poison. The authorities found a bottle of what appears to be an alcoholic concentration of the "moonshine" type, and a bad quality at that.

Dr. Fairchild was the son of the late Joseph B. Fairchild, and leaves his mother, a young wife and one child. He was an exceptionally bright young man with promise of a fine future.
