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BURGLES ROB STORE AT SIMCOE

Fur Coats and Other Goods Taken From Premises of H. S. Falls' Store on Sunday

SIMCOE, Nov. 14.—Burglars visiting the H. S. Falls' Company department store here during the early hours of this morning and carried off all the expensive fur coats, a number of men's overcoats and expensive dresses and dresses. An attempt was made to force an entrance into the vault by breaking through the brick wall near the door, but evidently the thieves were frightened away before they could complete this and reach the cash box, which had been placed in the vault.

Apparently a member of the gang was hidden somewhere inside the store when the establishment was locked up for the night, as no entrance was forced. As the thieves happened to work on a night when the watchman was not on duty, the burglary was not discovered until H. S. Falls happened to visit the store about 6 o'clock this afternoon.

It was discovered that the section men's toolhouse at the Lake Erie and Northern Radial yards had been broken into apparently in search for tools. A motor car was also stolen from the private garage of Fred Brook, two blocks from the store. Mr. Brook heard some men having trouble with a car on the street near his house about 3 a.m., but, finding his garage doors closed, he made no further investigation and did not discover the loss of his automobile until about noon.

PROHIBITION UNION OFFICER RESIGNS

Treasurer at Sarnia Openly Supports Ferguson Policy — Declares the — O. T. A. Has Failed

SARNIA, Nov. 10.—L. N. Byrns, former treasurer of the Sarnia Prohibition Union, and re-elected to that office at a meeting of the Prohibition Union held recently in the Baptist church, today publicly refused to accept the office to which he was elected and announced his support of the Government control policy of Premier Ferguson as the best temperance legislation.

Mr. Byrns has held the office of treasurer of the Prohibition Union for years and has written C. E. Cragg, president, saying: "I decline to accept the office for the following reasons."

Mr. Byrns goes on to announce his acceptance of Government control and charges that the temperance issue is being made a political football to bring about the defeat of the Conservative Government that "gave us all the temperance legislation that has been put on the statute books."

Mr. Byrns, who is one of the strongest temperance men in Lambton County and a member of the Prohibition Union for years, advises his friends to vote for the Government control candidate and not vote with the rum-runners who are carrying on their nefarious work on the river front.

TEXT OF LETTER

Following is the text of the letter of resignation:

Rev. C. E. Cragg,
President Prohibition Union.
Dear Sir:

Having been informed that at a meeting held in the Baptist Sunday School on Monday, November 1st, I was not being present, I was re-elected treasurer of the Prohibition Union of Sarnia, I take this opportunity of declining to accept for the following reasons.

There are two questions before the electors in this coming campaign: First, Will we still continue Government control under the Ontario Temperance Act, as we have had it for the last few years, whereby any person wanting liquor can buy all his liquors from the bootlegger, or rum-runners, without any stipulation as to the amount he shall purchase, regardless of their age.

Second. Or will we have it controlled so that a person can only buy it through a Government commission house where a person has got to have a permit to buy it and then only a certain quantity at a time and it must not be consumed in the commission house or in any public place and minors are not allowed to get a permit.

O. T. A. IS FAILURE

And being convinced that the O. T. A., so far as controlling the traffic, has been a failure for the reason that the King Government at Ottawa has given out home brew permits promiscuously all over this province and (Continued on Page 4)

FIRST PRIZE ESSAY—GIRLS

DOES GOVERNMENT CONTROL CONTROL LIQUOR TRAFFIC?

The Haldimand Prohibition Union convention was held in the Courthouse in Cayuga on Tuesday afternoon, November 9th. The house was filled with representatives from all parts of the county. Mr. Leonard Parke, of Caledonia, president of the society, was chairman of the meeting, while Mr. Gilpin, of Dunnville, acted as secretary. Besides several interesting discussions, three addresses were delivered by special speakers.

Rev. D. N. McLachlan, of Toronto, who has recently returned from the Western Provinces, where he spent several years as a minister of the Gospel, was the first speaker. His address consisted of a report in figures and facts to show that Government Control has been a complete failure in the provinces of British Columbia, Manitoba and Alberta, in attaining the objectives which it was intended to secure. 1. To stop bootlegging. He declared that only a short time ago the Attorney General of B. C. stated publicly that the bootleggers of that province sold more liquor than did the government stores; and in many cases they get their supply from government stores. In the next place: 2. They expected to reduce the provincial debt. But that has doubled since the liquor came in, because, the police force has had to be much increased in order to round up the drunks. The extra expenses of keeping up the jails and poorhouses, whose inmates have greatly increased. Last year the people of B. C. spent (\$15,000,000) fifteen million dollars in intoxicating liquors. At that ratio Ontario would spend about fifty million dollars a year in strong drink.

The next speaker was Rev. J. C. Madill, Presbyterian pastor of Dunnville. He also has recently returned from Saskatchewan, which province he claims, is the worst of the western four for strong drink. He stated that the word, Government Control, was a mockery and a laughing-stock, in fact they have dropped the word "Control" and now use the word "Sale," and call it "Government Sale." He stated an incident, that in a certain village of 500 inhabitants, his brother, also a minister, complained to the authorities about so much bootlegging going on, they appointed this minister as private detective and in two weeks he caught ten and had them severely (Continued on Page 4)
