(Too late for last issue) Wet weather is the order of the day, making fall work very difficult.


Mathias Schilz recently ran into, or the colt ran into his new Pearless car and smashed the radiator. As a result the colt died.

Our old and esteemed townsman, Mr. Charles Sehler, called (unattended) and made some purchases Wednesday, November 3rd, his 94th birth-


Mrs. R. S. Gage did not wish to miss seeing the Birthday Cake and was a visitor at the store last week. Mrs. Gage is 92 years old.
