## LEATHERDALE'S BURGLARIZED

### GAIN ENTRANCE THROUGH THE FRONT DOOR — THIEVES HEAD CAR FOR DOVER

On Sunday morning, about 3:30 o'clock, thieves entered Reg. Leatherdale's store and made a get-away with goods consisting of gents' furnishings, suits, shirts, some tea, cigars, a typewriter and about \$40 in cash.

Entrance was gained through the front door, which was pried open. Evidence also shows that efforts had been made to enter from the rear.

G. L. Miller was awakened by the noise and immediately got in touch with Reg. over the phone. By the time Reg. and Mr. Ball had arrived at the Rexall Store, the car which bore the thieves away was just turning the corner and heading for Port Dover.

The value of the goods taken is estimated to be between \$800 and \$1000. Police have been detailed on the case.

## OSGOODE HALL

The executors of the will of Sarah Abraham applied to Hon. Mr. Justice Rose, a judge of the Supreme Court at Osgoode Hall, last week for directions and advice.

Sarah Abraham made a will dated September 9th, 1922, containing a clause: "I direct that the whole of my estate remaining shall be given to the Foreign Mission Fund of The Presbyterian Church in Canada," and she died on March 22nd, 1925. The United Church of Canada Act came into force on June 10th, 1925. The testatrix was opposed to Church Union. It was held that the bequest, amounting to about \$1800.00 went to The United Church of Canada under the statute which provided that all general property belonging to the Presbyterian Church shall be vested in the United Church. The Act provides for the appointment of a commission to divide the general property equitably.

Harrison Arrell, K.C., appeared for the executors, R. S. Cassels, K.C., for the continuing Presbyterian Church, and G. W. Masop, K.C., for the United Church.
