form to its constitution and by-laws. But I must know these before I can conform to them—and unless they appeal to my reason—refuse to link up with them, or break a connection in-advicably made.

Canada needs today that her public men cease to array themselves in competition with each other, much less in opposition to each other. She needs sorely that the best and brightest minds of all schools of thought co-operate to cleanse national life, the reproach which rests upon it—and which has been partially laid bare by the Customs Investigation thus far. A full investigation which shall result in bringing every delinquent official to the bar of justice, regardless of who or what he may be in the political, business, or social world.

Canada First—the watchword.
To insure this the individual members of Parliament must be such as will put national claims in the forefront of their thought and action. Men or women who cannot and will not be swayed by any lesser consideration, who recognize fealty to two great things—their country's welfare, and the welfare of their constituency as an integral part of that country. Men or women who will work heart and soul for the advantage of the land we love, with the fact that "Righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people." Who are convinced that "the end does not justify the means"—if the end is worthy, and that no mean can justify an unworthy end or aim. That to put party advantage or personal profit before national welfare is the act of a traitor.

When will we cease to elect men or women for the purpose of contending for power?
When will we, deploring that at such times as these public questions shall be discussed from a public rather than a partisan viewpoint?
When these are accomplished the way will be clear for "government of the people, for the people, by the people" in very truth.

TWO KINDS OF FRIENDSHIP FOR FARMERS

One would imagine that, given five years of office, Mr. King could and would have done a great deal for the farmers of Canada. But what has he done? Absolutely nothing! Worse still, he has shown contempt for the members of the House of Commons who directly represented farmers. For four years he used the farmer's members to keep himself in power, then during the election of 1925 he fought them tooth and nail and did everything he could to bring about their defeat. It was thus he thanked them for their support!

During the past session of the House of Commons he employed the same tactics, and again used these farmer members to the limit, just to keep himself in power. And now, during the present campaign, he is using all his skill and dexterity to ensure there being no Liberal opposition to these farmer candidates who will pledge themselves to support him. In this way he hopes to make Liberals out of them, and thus complete the annihilation of the farmer

party.
On the other hand the Conservatives have always opposed the entrance of a third party in Parliament. The farmers of Canada were never left in ignorance as to where the Conservatives stood. At the same time those same Conservatives have done more for the farmers than have the Liberals. And now they have come out with a policy of co-operative marketing which is the one thing above all others that the farmers of Canada most need today.

It is not proposed to control the marketing of farm produce, but to assist it and keep the actual working of the system in the farmers' hands, where it belongs. The setting and maintaining of standards, assistance in the organization of pools for marketing the different commodities; training and maintaining a staff of inspectors to enforce the standards agreed upon, providing warehouses for the storage of farm produce so that it can be fed to the market in proportion to the demand, instead of being dumped as at the present—all these are things which could very properly be assisted by the Government, and which will be so assisted if the Conservative Government is returned to power on September the 14th next.

The farmers of Canada have been encouraged and assisted in the production end of their industry, but of what use is this if they lack the facilities for the orderly marketing of their produce? Now they have an offer of real assistance, and it is to their interest to see that the offer is not rejected.—Contributed.
