dear, and give to the party even yet the loyalty which their fathers gave to its early leaders.

These electors forget that these great principles are practically forgotten save as they are used for election cries.

Some of them are blaming the independent members who refused to support Mackenzie King and thereby forced his resignation. Can you imagine Mackenzie King's great grandfather, or George Brown, or any of the founders of Liberalism condescending to ask support in such a case?

If history portrays their characters aright—the desire for power was in these men subservient to the establishment of principle. Further, it was their adherence to principle which raised them to power, and which has given every one of them a place in the history of this great Dominion which no time-serving politician can ever hope to attain.

It is with these ideas in mind that the appeal is made to Canadian Citizens at this time to hold themselves free from subservience to partyism and elect members who, while independent of party control shall be dependent solely upon their electors—who finance their election and whose representative they can be, as no one elected by a party, financed by central party funds can possibly be for "He who pays the piper calls the tune."

THE WOMEN'S VOTE

The keen interest manifested by the women of Canada in the current political campaign naturally gives rise to the question, to what side will the majority of the women voters lend their support?

Inasmuch as women are not much given to partisanship it may be assumed that they will be influenced very largely by the actual merits of the questions at issue in this campaign. Mr. King has endeavored to prove that the main issue of the campaign is what he calls "the constitutional question," but we may very properly question Mr. King's sincerity in this connection, and the women of Canada do very largely seem to doubt Mr. King's sincerity.

The fact is, and the women are sensible of it that there has been in the administration of one of the most important departments of our Government a very grave abuse of the trust accorded by the people to those in charge of that department. This is incontrovertible. The women of Canada know it. Mr. King or his supporters cannot deny it. They can only seek to gloss it over. And the women of Canada know that these grave abuses in the customs depart-

ment not only have defrauded the country of many millions of dollars, but have worked such hardship upon Canadian concerns engaged in the manufacture or legitimate importation of lines of goods which had to compete on our markets with smuggled goods—smuggled to the knowledge of corrupt officials and to the knowledge of Mr. King himself—that in many cases they have destroyed Canadian business enterprises.

And so when Mr. Meighen contends that the issue of this campaign is the purging of our Government of that moral rotteness which was revealed by the Customs probe, he receives a very sympathetic hearing from the women of the Dominion. All through history woman has been ready to lend her support to clean government, and more to her than to man has a scandalous conduct of public affairs been revolting. She has shown herself not quick to act upon fancied abuses, but strongly to resent such an actual wrong as that perpetrated by the Government of Mr. King, in suffering the country to be despoiled by the lawlessness from without, aided by treachery from within.—Contributed.

SIDEWALKS ON THE PIKES?

Sidewalks may have to be provided along all rural highways at some time in the future. They would cost an enormous amount of money and probably would introduce a complicating factor into the problem of road improvement.

If sidewalks along rural roads generally are not to become imperative a way will have to be found to protect pedestrians from road hogs. People afoot have equal rights on the roads with automobiles. Yet there are large numbers of drivers who ignore pedestrians' rights, imperil their safety and seem to take delight in bespattering them with mud or covering them with dust. Considerate drivers there are, but they appear to be few, and the walker on the public highway is in grave danger from the large numbers of inconsiderate ones.

The "rules of the road" do not appear to apply with respect to people afoot. That courtesy which has grown up among motorists, often more respected in the breach than in the observance though it be, should be extended. If pedestrian's rights are not voluntarily recognized and respected, steps will have to be taken to enforce them, or safe walks beside the rural roads will have to be provided. It is for motorists in the country to make plain whether they want more restrictions on their liberties or higher taxes for road improvements, which must come if they do not accord more consideration than is due from them to walkers.
