#### Here and There

Honor was conferred upon  
Captain James Turnbull, C.R.E.,  
P.N.R. commander of the Canadian  
Pacific steamship Montclair recent-  
ly when he was appointed Aide-de-  
Camp to His Majesty King George V.

All of the records were shattered  
recently when K. Tanaka, local Jap-  
anese golfer, playing on the Cana-  
dian Pacific course "Lanzara," scored  
a hole in one twice in one round  
of the eighteen-hole links. The first  
was obtained at the fifth hole which  
is 115 yards, and the second at the  
sixteenth hole, which is 210 yards.

During the month of January of  
the present year automobile produc-  
tion in Canada has increased 98 per-  
cent over and above the production  
for the corresponding month of last  
year being 15,376 cars, as compared  
with 7,752 for the previous year. Al-  
most half of the cars produced were  
for export, according to the Domini-  
on Bureau of Statistics.

In memory of the late Col. George  
H. Ham, of Montreal, dean of railway  
publicity men in North America, a  
beautiful memorial porch is being  
erected over the door of St. John's  
Church at Whitby by the members  
of the Women's Canadian Press Club.  
The late Col. Ham died in Montreal  
on April 16 last.

Nara, Japan.—Eleven passengers  
on the Round-the-World cruise of  
the Canadian Pacific flagship Em-  
press of Scotland squeezed through  
a rectangular hole in a pillar just  
behind the colossal image of Buddha  
in the Daibutsu Temple here yester-  
day, thereby achieving, according to  
ancient tradition, the short road to  
Paradise.

The Board of Control at Toronto  
have formally accepted the offer  
made by Sir Leicester Harmsworth,  
English Baronet, of Mournier's por-  
trait of General John Graves Sim-  
coe, after whom the County of Sim-  
coe was named. General Simcoe set  
up his first government at York,  
now Toronto. The painting will be  
hung in the Toronto City Hall, al-  
ready adorned with a collection of  
historical paintings recognized as one  
of the finest of its kind in America.

"Ave atque Vale" (Hail and Fare-  
well), echoed through the austere  
precincts of the Canadian Pacific  
Railway offices Board Room in Mon-  
treal recently, when the Westminster  
Boys Choir, in token of their appre-  
ciation and thanks for the care and  
the thought taken in their behalf  
during their 6,000-mile tour of Cana-  
da which they completed on March  
16, when they sailed on the C. P.  
liner Minnedosa, sang a parting song  
in Latin for E. W. Beatty, chairman  
and president of the Company, in  
whose care they had made their  
memorable journey.

Their Excellencies the Governor-  
General and Lady Willingdon will be  
given a warm welcome on the occa-  
sion of their first visit officially to  
Western Canada, the many centres  
through which they will pass are al-  
ready preparing to receive them.  
They will leave Ottawa by special  
Canadian Pacific train March 19, and  
are scheduled to arrive at Vancou-  
ver March 25. Leaving the latter  
city they will go on to Victoria the  
same afternoon and will spend a  
couple of weeks visiting points of  
interest on Vancouver Island, re-  
turning to Vancouver April 19.

Back from a short trip to England  
on Canadian Pacific and Telegram  
business, John MacMillan, gen-  
eral manager of telegraphs of the rail-  
way, returned on C. P. steamship  
Montclair and has again taken up  
his duties. Mr. MacMillan is a  
pioneer of the railway and has been  
on the Pacific Coast in connection with  
the new overland route since the  
second Australian gold rush com-  
pleted during his time. The material  
which represents a line of a  
hundred miles in two sections was  
inspected under Mr. MacMillan's  
supervision and will be  
completed to this country early in  
April.

Feted by the Governor of the  
state, the Mayor and many other  
prominent people of Columbus, Ohio,  
has been the experience of Sam-  
uel, Micmac guide of the Milford  
camp in Nova Scotia, who arrived  
recently on his return from a two-  
day visit to Columbus, where he  
attended the convention and banquet  
of the League of Ohio Sportsmen.  
It is noted throughout the woods

men on Canadian hunting facilities,

#### Here and There

Alberta is now the largest producer  
of oil and gas in Canada. In 1925  
the production of gas amounted to  
approximately 9,000,000 thousand  
cubic feet, and the production of oil  
185,000 barrels.

Louis Kon, trade delegate to the  
Union of Soviet Socialist Repub-  
lics, confirms the report that an  
order for \$1,000,000 worth of bran-  
der twine has been placed with a  
Brandon firm. Other large or-  
ders for Canada are pending.

During the season of 1926 over  
36,000 square miles of mineralized  
areas in the Dominion were map-  
ped out by means of aerial photo-  
graphy, according to the Depart-  
ment of Natural Resources at Otta-  
wa. This is one of the most im-  
portant uses to which aerial photo-  
graphy has been adapted.

A bill to establish a fish, game  
and wild life sanctuary in the in-  
terior of Nova Scotia has been pass-  
ed in the Legislature. The sanctu-  
ary is to be located at the intersec-  
tion of the counties of Annapolis,  
Digby, Yarmouth and Shelburne.  
Others may follow in other  
parts of the province in the near  
future.

A large single shipment of motor  
oil, a solid trainload of 26 cars of  
Marvelube, left Sarnia for various  
points in the west, but mostly for  
Vancouver. The oil is a Canadian-  
manufactured product which has  
been developed within the past year  
at Fort William the special train  
was handed over to the Canadian  
Pacific Railway for exhibition along  
its lines.

Announcement of the offer of two  
scholarships annually by E. W.  
Beatty, chairman and president of  
the Canadian Pacific Railway, and  
Chancellor of McGill University, to  
the first male candidate in Greek  
and Latin, and to the highest male  
candidate in mathematics enter-  
ing the University, was made re-  
cently by Sir Arthur Currie, prin-  
cipal of McGill. A prize of \$500 is  
attached to each scholarship.

According to the department of  
Colonization and Development of  
the Canadian Pacific Railway, there  
is every indication that there will  
be a great increase in the number  
of immigrants coming to Canada  
this year compared with the num-  
ber locating during 1925. It has  
been estimated that immigration  
figures for this year will be almost  
double those of the past year. Since  
the first of the present year Cana-  
dian Pacific liners have brought  
to Canada approximately 15,000 new  
settlers.

E. W. Beatty, chairman and pre-  
sident of the Canadian Pacific Rail-  
way, announced from headquarters  
recently that the name of the new  
hotel now being erected at Regina  
would be "Hotel Saskatchewan."  
The new C.P.R. hotel at this place  
will be an eleven story structure  
containing 284 bedrooms with bath  
and will cost in the neighborhood  
of \$1,000,000, the opening being  
scheduled for May 24. The hotel is  
being built on one of the finest sites  
in the city on Victoria Avenue, fac-  
ing the park. It will be only within  
a few minutes' walk from the  
C.P.R. Station.

The Canadian Pacific Railway  
made an excellent showing in 1926,  
gross revenue for the twelve months  
being the best shown since 1920,  
while net revenue was the best  
shown since 1917, being nearly 4 1/2  
per cent ahead of the fine record of  
1925. In gross earnings from rail-  
way and lake steamers the year re-  
sulted in a very notable increase  
over the preceding fiscal year, the  
showing being one of the best on  
record, while income from special  
sources, including ocean steamers,  
held up well, being only slightly be-  
low that of 1925, and also being one  
of the best exhibits ever made by  
the company.
