THE HALIMAND BACON HOG FAIR

Minutes of Meeting Held in the Women's Institute Hall, Nelles Corners, Friday Evening, April 8

A public meeting was held in the Women's Institute Hall, Nelles Corners on Friday evening, April 8th, for the purpose of discussing the advisability of holding a Bacon Hog Fair for Haldimand County in 1927. The President, Mr. Frank Laidlaw, occupied the chair, and the Secretary, Mr. Hector Grogan, read the minutes of the last meeting. The following motions were passed:

Porter-Mine—That the minutes of the last meeting be adopted as read. Carried.

Fleming-Gailing—That the financial statement be adopted as read. Carried.

Lamb-Hodgson—That a Bacon Hog Fair be held in 1927, on or about October 11th. Carried.

Main-Lamb—That there be a class for young boars, born after January 1st, 1927, and to be at least 5 months of age and eligible for registration. Carried.

Main-Lamb—That Hector Grogan act as Secretary-Treasurer for 1927. Carried.

Porter-Gailing—That Frank Laidlaw act as President for 1927. Carried.

Miller-Mine—That Finance Committee for the 1927 Fair be as follows: Murray Hodgson, Amos Porter, Wm. Gilbertson, Wm. R. Schwyer, Norman B. Patterson. Carried.

Porter-Fleming—That Live Stock Committee for the 1927 Fair be as follows: Wray Parkinson, Fred Pratt, Harvey Schwyer, Geo. O. Miller, E. P. Murray, C. A. Welch, Emmet Doyle, Hector Grogan, Wm. R. Schwyer, Wm. Gilbertson, Norman B. Patterson, Gordon Roth, Fred G. Lishman, F. Laidlaw, Harry Lamb. Carried.

The above men are caretakers of the Bacon Hog Clubs organized under the Live Stock Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Duff Packing Company, Hamilton. Those present at the meeting believed that these men would greatly assist in making a success of the Bacon Hog Fair by soliciting entries from the members in the various Bacon Hog Clubs.

Main-Porter—That all members of Bacon Hog Clubs in Haldimand County donate the sum of 25c each, to

want, the prize list of the Bacon Hog Fair. Carried.

Lamb-Ebert—That Finance Committee interview the township council of Walpole, Oneida, Rainham, N. Cayuga and Seneca for a donation for the fair and endeavor to secure as many specials as possible. Carried.

Resolutions—The Executive estimated the prize money for the 1927 Fair at \$450.00 to cover the prizes given in the various classes.

Mr. J. E. Brown then gave an interesting address re changes in hog grading.

Attendance, 20.

Lamb-Hodgson—That this meeting do now adjourn to meet again at the call of the President. Carried.

INTERESTING REPORT FROM U. C. BIBLE SOCIETY

The recent report of the Upper Canada Bible Society for the year 1926, contains one or two items of special interest and importance to those interested in the furtherance of the society's work.

The copies of the Scriptures (Bibles and Portions) circulated by the Auxiliary in their territory numbered 127,759—the largest number in any year of its history. A large number of branches showed a substantial increase in their contributions, some establishing a record for giving.

The total amount received from the branches was however somewhat smaller than the previous year. This is largely accounted for by the falling off in the contributions received from some of the larger cities and towns where during 1925 a large number of Life Memberships were received in connection with the celebrations commemorating the publication of William Tyndall's English New Testament in 1525.

MAY OPEN LIQUOR STORES ON MAY 16

Now Appointing Vendors—May Not Limit Amount To Be Sold To Permit Holder

TORONTO, April 12.—While the members of the liquor control board practice strict reticence regarding their activities, it is learned that they plan to place liquor on sale in Ontario under the Government control system on Monday, May 16. By that time, it is stated, the board will have at least 30 stores located throughout the province stocked and equipped for business.

At the present time the board is engaged in appointing vendors, but the stores refrain to be located, although the districts have been decided upon.

It is understood that the board will not place any limit on the quantity of liquor or beer that may be sold to a permit holder, but will strictly enforce the cancellation regulation where abuse of privilege is shown. The law empowers the board to cancel a permit at any time without giving a reason. The permits will be ready well in advance of the opening of the stores.
