HAMILTON COUPLE HURT IN AUTOMOBILE COLLISION

Brantford, April 18—Mr. and Mrs. Hamill, 36 Dundurn Street, Hamilton, were the victims of an auto collision early this morning, the ambulance being summoned and the pair taken to their home in Hamilton. Mrs. Hamill was driving toward her home city when, about five miles down the road, she ran into a standing car on the highway, which, Mrs. Hamill says, was without lights. The Hamilton auto piled right into the other car with such force as to catapult the husband through the windshield. Mrs. Hamill was also thrown against the steering wheel so violently as to break it in three pieces. She suffered a broken arm, besides other injuries. The husband was severely cut by his impact with the glass.

Mr. Hamill is well known in Jarvis, being a conductor on the way-freight from Hamilton for a number of years.

DEATH CLAIMS A RESPECTED CITIZEN

The people of this village were shocked on Monday evening last, April 11th, to hear of the sudden and unexpected death of Mr. John F. Ivey.

He had been sick only for a short time and at no time was his case considered dangerous, but pneumonia seized upon him and death came with startling suddenness.

Mr. Ivey was born in Walpole about 64 years ago, and never lived outside of the township. His life was spent as a farmer until 1915, when he retired and came to live in the Village of Jarvis; since then he has followed the carpenter business as a pastime. He was never married. As a lad in early life, he joined the Methodist church and remained a faithful member of the same to the end. For many years he has been a trustee of Wesley church, also a member of the Board of Management. He was of a quiet, unassuming disposition, a good neighbor, always ready to give a helping hand, and always had a deep respect for everything that was for good. He will be greatly missed in this vicinity.

The funeral took place on Thursday afternoon last. After a short service in the home, a public service was held in Wesley United Church, and attended by a large concourse of sympathizing neighbors and friends.

The service was conducted by Rev. H. Brand, assisted by Rev. Dr. S. W. Falls, of Toronto, a cousin of the deceased.

Mr. Ivey leaves to mourn his departure, two sisters, Elizabeth and Frances, both at home, and one brother, Albert, who keeps a large furniture store and an undertaking establishment in Collingwood.

He was a good man and his end was peace.
