JARVIS' NEW FIRE TRUCK HERE

On Wednesday evening last the Lorne Tractors Limited, of Ingersoll, delivered the splendid new "Lorne" Fire Engine ordered from them by the Jarvis Council a short time ago, and it is certainly a smart looking outfit.

The chassis is a Chevrolet ten truck on which the "Lorne" fire equipment is mounted, a steel hose body with a capacity of 1000 feet of 2 1/2 inch hose, two 35-gallon chemical tanks with 200 feet chemical hose with the newest type of eccentric shut-off nozzle which is a wonderful improvement. Extra containers for re-charges are carried on the outfit. The chemical tanks are the latest "Champion" recoving type, same as used in the large city departments, and seem to be a great improvement over the old type.

The tanks were charged by the firemen under the direction of Fire Chief Elliott and demonstrated with excellent results, showing a pressure of 175 lbs. and a very strong stream.

Hand chemicals, axe, crow bar, lanterns, ladders, etc., are carried on the outfit, in fact a very complete, compact little outfit, beautifully finished in Fire Department red, nicely scroled and striped in genuine gold leaf, also the name "Jarvis F. D." on each side of the body. The screeching siren could be heard all over town clearing the traffic. A large searchlight is also mounted on the dash.

The outfit is so arranged that at a later date a fire pump may be installed, at very low cost, if the council desire. This equipment is very creditable and places Jarvis in a position equal if not superior to many of the larger towns.

In conversation with Mr. Carmichael, Manager of the Lorne Tractors Limited, who manufactured this equipment, he stated that there was a very large demand for their Lorne Fire Engines, their factory being rushed to the limit to keep up with the demand. He also complimented Jarvis on its splendidly organized Fire Brigade under the direction of Chief Elliott.
