### RESULTS OF MIDDLE SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS AT JARVIS CONTINUATION SCHOOL

The following is the very creditable record of the students writing Middle School at Jarvis. Of the 168 papers written, 86% were successful. In the subjects of Algebra, Geometry, Physics, Chemistry, Latin Authors and French Authors, there were no failures and in these subjects, out of 85 papers, 27 obtained first class honors, 13 second, and 12 third.

This is a record that reflects great credit on the late principal of our Continuation School, Mr. F. R. Archibald, and his leaving to accept the principalship of the Hallville Consolidated School has been a great loss in the ranks of the teaching profession in this county as well as our own school, but we wish for him continued success in his chosen profession.
