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INTERESTING LECTURES AT THREE MONTHS' SCHOOL

From Monday, Dec. 12th to Thursday, Dec. 22nd, some very interesting lectures and demonstration on Farm Mechanics will be given by Mr. Newcome of Toronto. His lectures take in the care and use of tools and farm workshop practice; machine belts and lacings; ropes, knots and splices; repair of wood, metal, leather and rubber equipment; care of farm machinery; the use of concrete on the farm; construction of silos, farm water supply and sewage disposal; and plans of stables, barns and piggeries, including lighting and ventilation. These lectures should be of real value to all young men in the district and a special invitation is extended to any farmers who care to come in for the lectures.

On Tuesday, Dec. 13th, Mr. H. J. Moore of Toronto, will lecture on Floriculture, which includes the amateur propagation of house plants; care; perennial borders and growing of annuals; laying out home grounds; care of trees and shrubs. Mr. Moore's lectures will be illustrated by beautiful lantern slides. Everyone interested is welcome to attend as his lectures are a treat to hear.

On Tuesday, December 13th and Wednesday, December 14th, lectures will be given by Mr. A. N. Ure of Roseland, on Bees, which takes in the care and management of bees, including wintering, feeding and swarming; extracted honey; apiary equipment; prevention and treatment of bee diseases. Everyone interested in bee-keeping is invited to be present.

On Thursday, December 15th and Friday, December 16th, some interesting lectures will be given on Forestry by Mr. Leslie Reid of the Forestry Branch, Toronto. His outline includes the farm wood lot; planting roadside trees; windbreaks; ornamentation of farm buildings; reforestation waste lands.

Miss Edith Collins of Ancaster, is giving some very interesting lectures and demonstrations on Sewing which includes the choice of style and materials, use of patterns, cutting, fitting and drafting, stitches, machine work and remodeling. The sewing course continues until December 22.

Miss Lulu Row is giving some very able demonstrations in Foods and Cookery. Inquire from Miss Row as to the time for these demonstrations. They are usually given in the morning.

It will be noted by the above program that we have a most interesting course of study from December 12th to 22nd, and we hope to have an increased attendance. The lectures are of a high standard.

The members of the Jarvis Short Course Committee, composed of Mrs. Thos. Guiler, Mrs. J. M. Schreiber, Mrs. Wm. Robinson, Mrs. W. W. Hoebel, Mrs. Helen Steel and Mrs. G. L. Miller, gave a reception to the students of the Three Months' School in Peacock's Hall on Friday, December 2nd, from 4 to 5 p.m. The attendance at this reception composed of students, officials, etc., was 125.

The reception was conducted in a very appropriate manner. Mrs. Guiler and Mrs. Schreiber were introduced and shook hands with every student attending the School. The students were introduced by Miss Row and Mr. Hart. This gave them a real welcome as well as a little training in the art of reception. After the students were assembled, Mrs. Thos. Guiler acted as chairman and was supported at the head table by Mrs. Peart, President of the County W. I., and Mrs. Parkinson, Secretary of the County W. I. Mrs. Guiler gave a very creditable address and conducted the program in a very efficient manner. The first number on the program was an address by Mr. G. L. Miller, Reeve of Jarvis. Mr. Miller in his remarks extended a real welcome to the students of the School and gave them the freedom of Jarvis.

He also outlined the requirements necessary for success in life and gave an address which will long be remembered by the students. The next number on the program was an instrumental selection by Miss Meta MacMurchy which was greatly appreciated by all present. This was followed by an address by Mr. W. J. Saunders, Reeve of Walpole, whose remarks were of a very practical nature in that they pointed out to the students the opportunities which they had of securing an education in a short three months. Both addresses delivered by Mr. Miller and Mr. Saunders were very appropriate for the occasion and contained some valuable suggestions for the young people to follow in the next three months.

After Mr. Saunders' address, Miss Doris Kindree gave a vocal number which was of a very high standard. The students were then entertained to a cafeteria luncheon and given an opportunity of becoming acquainted with each other and having a real good social time.

The staff and students greatly appreciated the welcome and reception given by the members of the Short Course Committee and the officials of Jarvis and Walpole, and wish to extend their thanks through the columns of the Jarvis Record for the same. It was a very important event in the history of the School in that it gave the School a standing of some importance in the district through the publicity which will follow and serves to create a more harmonious feeling between the students and the citizens of Jarvis and the community in general.

A vote of thanks was moved by Mr. Cyril Saunders and seconded by Miss Doris Inson. Mr. Saunders also acted as cheer leader and had the class in Agriculture give their yell.
