**Express Cargo Steamers For C. P. R.**



The fourth of the five 10,000 ton cargo steamers under construction in the Old Country for the Atlantic service of the Canadian Pacific was launched recently from the yards of Messrs. Barclay, Curle and Co., Glasgow. With appropriate ceremonies and in the presence of a large gathering of Canadian Pacific Officials, the new ship was christened the "Beaverhill" by Miss Mavis Gillies, (inset) daughter of Captain James Gillies, general manager of the Canadian Pacific Steamships Ltd.  
When these new steamers are delivered, the Canadian Pacific cargo fleet will be augmented by five of the highest type of express cargo steamers and capable of maintaining a speed of 14 knots an hour, which is regarded as exceptional for cargo steamers. The marked growth of ocean trade between Great Britain and Canada via the St. Lawrence route, has prompted the Canadian Pacific to augment their freight service to this extent. These vessels will be used to maintain a weekly service between Canadian ports and those in Great Britain and on the Continent.  
The new freighter, like her sister ships the Beaverburn, Beaverdale, Beaverford and Beaverbrue, is 520 feet in length 61, and a half feet in width with a deadweight carrying capacity of approximately 10,000 tons and load draft of 27 feet; but should a need arise as much as 13,000 tons may be carried on the maximum load draft. The ships will be driven by twin screws.

...and farm home, from cottage and mart they rallied to the British colors in teeming thousands, prepared to sacrifice their all for the liberty and emancipation of their fellow beings. Canada's gallant sons were in it. Yes, tens of thousands of our brave boys bade their beloved a last farewell. Over the rolling billows went they on great ocean grayhounds towards the scenes of hostilities, under the protection of England's mighty and matchless navy—the pride and flower of the deep. For over four long tedious years this dreadful conflict waged between two great nations—Justice and Liberty vs. Ignorance and Greed. For four long years the whole civilized world waited in silent suspense on this human frailty of progress and supremacy, and still the battle raged with increasing ferocity and mortality. The greatest implements that modern science and invention could conceive were employed to determine the issue. The reverberation of millions of guns and canon resounded as though the whole spectacle was a veritable hell—in fact the whole earth was on the brink of a seething caldron. Yet our brave Tommies and fearless Tars fought on tenaciously, without thought of defeat or surrender. They were thickly imbued with that familiar British tradition—"What we have we'll hold."—They held what they had and gained even more. Like a coward this very man, whom you may now call Mr. William Hohenzollern, he was doomed to defeat, hastily sought from molestation only by the laws of neutrality and the dykes of Holland, where he still sojourns seriously meditating on his own folly, reflecting on the thought that it takes more than a mighty blow to submerge that "little speck on the horizon." He has since suffered the stigma of seeing his once powerful kingdom tottle from its high seat of destiny into the sublime state of a Republic. But what of our brave boys who carried the victorious banner over the top? Who preferred to enter the jaws of death and sacrifice their all for our liberty? They who bid us good bye and departed for the battle grounds, never dreaming that they would find their last resting place forever in a foreign land under a plethora of human blood—far from their beloved ones? Well, have we forgotten them? No! No!! A grate-

ful nation can never forget her brave defenders, and like all other places dear old Jarvis lives up to this reputation. Early last spring these enthusiastic thoughtful ladies of the Women's Institute knew what should be done and set about to do their duty—not by word, but by deed. To Mrs. Church, the citizens of the Institute, we doff our hats and say, "Well done, ye noble servants, God bless your souls," and to our noble boys whose memory this monument commemorates we stand "at attention" and await the following message of love:  
All honor to You, gallant boys,  
Who went to war and died,  
For King and Country and our homes,  
You are our Empire's pride.  
All honor to You, noble boys,  
Who marched along and fell,  
The trials and torture you endured,  
No one but God can tell.  
All honor to You, fearless boys,  
Who faced the foeman's sneer,  
And brought such honor to our shores,  
Our land without a peer.  
All honor to You, glorious boys,  
Now sleeping over THERE,  
Down through the ages yet to come  
We will, your names, revere.
