MINUTES OF THE SESSION HELD AT CAYUGA DECEMBER 9

Council met pursuant to adjournment, with all the members present and the Warden in the chair. After the adoption of the minutes the communications were dealt with as follows:

Hamilton City Hospital, that the County of Haldimand would be held responsible for the maintenance of Hilton Cooper; Canadian Institute for the Blind and Haldimand War Memorial Hospital, asking for grants.

Association of Managers of Homes for the Aged and Infirmary, asking co-operation of the Council in two resolutions: 1 That the Provincial Government establish a home for feeble-minded and mentally defective, and 2 That the inmates from the Ontario Asylum be not removed to the House of Refuge; and J. S. Waddell, re expenses in connection with the Barker Ditch—all referred to Committee of the Whole.

A bylaw to appoint J. J. Parsons of Walpole and William Strong of Canboro to audit the accounts of the County Treasurer for 1928 was read three times and passed.

On the recommendation of the Printing and Insurance Committee, presented by Chairman Penny, payment of premiums of \$34.50 and \$69 on two policies totalling \$9,000 on the House of Refuge was ordered.

A bylaw to authorize the entering into of a contract with Wm. Gilbertson for the construction of a roadway south of Cranston at Big Hill, Oneida, according to the profile and specifications, for 97 cents a cubic yard, (Continued on Page 5)
