The following report of the Home Committee, presented by Chairman Ramsey, was adopted as read:

Live stock on the farm: 2 horses, 1 pony, 4 cows, 6 young pigs, 1 brood sow and 80 hens.

There was a small quantity of straw and about 35 tons of hay, also about 70 bushels of oats in the granary and some silage in the silo.

Number of inmates: 35; males 21, females 14. Health good.

We have checked over the House of Refuge and Children's Aid Society accounts and recommended them to the Finance Committee for payment.

The following report of the Good Roads Committee, presented by S. J. Scott, chairman, was adopted as read:

The paylists and accounts submitted by the Superintendent have been carefully checked over, and we recommend them for payment.

The Superintendent submitted statement showing the total expenditure on the county highway system during the period from January 1st to December 31st, 1927, amounting to approximately \$80,000.

The Superintendent will prepare and submit his annual report for consideration and approval of the County Council at the inaugural meeting on January 24th, showing the total expenditure in detail for the year.

The County machinery has been collected and stored in the shed at Hagersville and county buildings at the Kemmel quarry and Free Methodist shed in the village of Canboro.

Danger signs have been placed at several points along County Tourist Road No. 62, warning users of the highway to drive carefully and avoid accidents. Signs have also been placed on the other roads of the county system where danger exists.

After noting carefully the operation of the county highway system during the season of 1927, we would suggest to the Good Roads Committee of 1928 that some adjustments be made.

We recommend that permission be given Mr. W. Mitchell to install a gasoline pump on his property along Road No. 16, provided he will give a bond of indemnity to protect the County in case of an accident being caused by the installation.

The trees and brush on Road 5, including the big hill, have been cleared off, and the contractor, W. Gilbertson, has commenced on the cut and fill.

On account of winter having set in severely, and the lateness of the season, your committee decided it would not be profitable to do any more work this season except necessary maintenance.

We suggest that any outstanding accounts which may come in between this date and Dec. 31st, the Treasurer be authorized to pay, providing they are certified as correct by the Warden and Superintendent.

Your committee are pleased to say that all metalled roads on the county highway system were in very fair condition when winter comes.

The report of the Road and Bridge Committee, submitted by Chairman Lockie, recommending payment of a couple of accounts, was adopted as read.

the minutes. Carried.
Gleny-Saunders—That a grant of \$50 be made to R. E. French for special services as chairman of the Finance Committee for 1927. Carried.
The report of the Finance Committee, presented by Chairman R. E. French, which was adopted and read, recommended payment of a number of accounts, and that the Warden and Treasurer be authorized to borrow \$20,000 from the Canadian Bank of Commerce for good roads purposes.

Scott-Saunders—That we accept for \$2,000 in place of the bond mentioned in the agreement, and that the cheque be cashed and the proceeds be returned to Mr. Gilbertson when the contract is completed. Carried.

Ramsey-Penny—That the Council tender the Warden a hearty vote of thanks for the able manner in which he has presided over this Council during the year. Carried.

The Council having resolved itself into Committee of the Whole, with James Lockie in the chair, the following report of that committee was adopted as read:

Letters from Hamilton City Hospital and Canadian Institute for the Blind, that no action be taken.

That the usual grant of \$1200 be made to the Haldimand War Memorial Hospital.

Re letter from Association of Homes for Aged and Infirm, that we give our co-operation and support.

Re J. S. Waddell, that the Clerk be instructed to demand repayment of \$119 and to take criminal proceedings if thought necessary.

That Clerk be instructed to write to Me. Lee, asking if a mistake has been made in profile and plan prepared.

That Dr. C. F. Abbott be appointed physician for the House of Refuge. That we do not buy any material taken from the Caledonia bridge. That the salary of the jailer of the county jail be raised to \$1000 per yr.

Bylaws to appoint Dr. C. F. Abbott physician to the House of Refuge and to grant \$1200 to the Haldimand War Memorial Hospital were given three readings and passed, and Council adjourned sine die.
