The annual meeting of the members and officers of the Public Library was held in The Record office on Wednesday evening, January 19th, with Mr. Richard Shaver in the chair.

The treasurer's report showed a total receipt of \$237.30; expenditures, \$238.95 — leaving a small deficit of \$1.65, which the librarian reported he had cash on hand, which would cover that amount.

The librarian reported books issued, 3625 vols.; books purchased, 113 vols.; number of books in library, 3525 vols. Number of members, 82.

## GOVERNMENT SEED-CLEANING DEMONSTRATION TRAIN

Of Ontario to Visit Points in the CHALMERS CHURCH, WALPOLE, ANNUAL MEETING  
County of Haldimand—Will Stop at Jarvis

One day stops will be made at the C. N. R. Station at the following points in Haldimand County:

Fri., Feb. 18—Cayuga  
Sat., Feb. 19—JARVIS  
Mon., Feb. 21—Hagersville  
Tues., Feb. 22—Caledonia  
Wed., Feb. 23—Dunnville

The object of the Seed Train is to demonstrate the proper method of cleaning grain, grass and clover seed, and to interest farmers in better seed grain. Fifty bushels of wheat, oats or barley and ten bushels of small seeds will be required each day for demonstration purposes. Any farmer who will bring seed to the train for cleaning purposes should write to the Agricultural Office, Cayuga, stating the kind of seed, amount, and the point to which he will bring it for cleaning.

The train will consist of three cars, one of which will contain power and hand seed cleaning machinery. The second car will contain exhibition material, demonstrating the benefits to be derived from the proper cleaning of seed grain. The third coach will be a lecture car in which lectures will be given by special speakers at 2.30 p.m. each afternoon.

Seed cleaning will be demonstrated each day from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Farmers who bring in their grains and seed to the cars for cleaning purposes will, of course, TAKE HOME their cleaned grain and the screenings.

## DUNNVILLE AGRICULTURAL SCHOOL

Last week the Agricultural School, being held at Dunnville, had lectures on a subject closely allied to agriculture. Mr. G. E. Lane, B.S.A., B. Sc. F., of the Reforestry Division of the Ontario Forestry Branch, gave lectures on the following subjects:—"The Farm Woodlot," "The Reforestation of Waste Land," "Windbreaks, Shelterbelts, and Home Beautification" and "The Planting of Roadside Trees." The students were told how to do the planting in each case and the benefits derived.

It was pointed out that a well cared for woodlot could be made to produce a cord of wood per acre, per year, but under the present system of management, most of the woodlots of Ontario were only producing half that amount.

There was a time when Ontario White Pine was used to build our houses and Ontario Oak for hardwood flooring. Now houses are being built of Southern hard pine and B.C. fir. Hardwood flooring now comes from the Southern States. Red Gum from the South is now being used for interior trim.

This condition is partly due to letting our farm woodlots and pieces of waste land become unproductive. At present, Ontario is importing 199 million board feet of lumber for which she spends annually \$12,000,000. The United States supplies 144 percent of all the lumber used in Ontario, and Quebec supplies this province with 9 percent of all we use. The price of lumber has nearly doubled since 1911, and there is nothing to indicate that lumber will ever be any cheaper. For these reasons, the lecturer advised that all pieces of waste and unproductive land be put to growing trees as soon as possible.

Last year the Ontario Forestry Branch supplied to the people of Ontario over 5,000,000 trees, free. These went to over 3,000 applicants. This coming spring the Government proposes to give away 7,000,000 trees, free.

The lecturer also pointed out the proper way to go about establishing a municipal forest in any community. Already four counties have reforested thousand acre blocks of land, and 44 other municipalities have smaller demonstration plots of their own. In the case of these small plots the township or town buys a piece of waste land along some road, and the Government plants it free of charge. This is done solely to encourage reforestation and to demonstrate that where a tree once grew, there it will grow again. People and municipalities are encouraged to grow forests near enough to home markets so that long freight hauls will not eat up all the profits as so often happens in present day lumbering.

On Wednesday morning an illustrated lecture entitled "Our Forests and What They Mean to Us" was given to a joint class of the men and women agricultural students and to the High School students. This lecture showed fire fighting and fire detection, also paper making, lumbering, fishing, trapping and reforestation of waste land.

## MRS. ISABELLA GLANFIELD

After an illness of three months, she passed away at her home, at an early hour on Monday, January 10th, a life-long resident of this village and district in the person of Mrs. Isabella Glanfield, widow of the late William H. Glanfield, who died eight years ago. She was born on August 30th, 1856, on the farm of her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. William Trousdale, one-half mile west of this village.

Mrs. Glanfield resided in Jarvis for 50 years, during which time she was a valued member of the Jarvis Methodist Church. She was a lady of inestimable Christian character and was beloved by all who knew her. Her favorite hymns were sung at the funeral service conducted at the Wesley United Church by the Rev. H. Brand. She is survived by two sons and three daughters: Dr. William J. Glanfield, of Wallacetown; Edward J. Glanfield, of Midland; Mrs. Herman Miel, of Tilsonburg; Mrs. G. W. Amos, of Parkhill, and Mrs. L. D. Galbraith, of Appin.
