## CROWDED HOUSE GREET SCHOOL PERFORMERS

## FIRST SESSION OF COUNTY COUNCIL—FIRST DAY

Cayuga, January 25th, 1927.

The Council met pursuant to Statute at 2 p.m. The Clerk presiding. All the members present and filed their certificates of election as follows:

R. S. Colter, Reeve, Town of Cayuga; B. E. French, B.A., Reeve of Caledonia; Daniel Glenn, Reeve of Canboro; Elmer Honsberger, Reeve S. Cayuga; Thomas Jepson, Reeve of Hagersville; James H. Lockie, Reeve of N. Cayuga; Harcourt R. Kern, Reeve of Oneida; John E. Melick, Reeve of Moulton; George L. Miller, Reeve of Jarvis; Archie McDonald, Reeve, Sherbrooke; Wilbert James Penny, Reeve Dumville; Frank William Ramsey, Reeve, Dunn; Richard Sherk, Reeve of Rainham; Samuel J. Scott, Reeve of Seneca; Wm. Byron Shoup, D. Reeve, Walpole; Wm. James Saunders, Reeve Walpole; Wm. Hy. Wingfield, Reeve, Dumville; Colter-Lockie—That we do now organize as a Council. Carried.

Colter-Shoup—That James Lorkie, Reeve of Cayuga, be warden for 1927. Lost.

Miller-McDonald—In amendment—That H. R. Kern, Reeve of Oneida, be Warden for '27. Carried.

The Warden then took the declaration of office.

The minutes of the last meeting were then read.

Scott-French—That the minutes as read be adopted. Carried.

3. Letter from the City of Hamilton, asking the co-operation of the County of Haldimand in a petition to the Government that they should be relieved from contribution towards the cost of construction and maintenance of provincial sub-urban roads.

4. Letter from the School Trustees' Association, asking that delegates be appointed for the next meeting.

5. Letter from the Deputy Minister of Highways, asking that the County Road Superintendent attend the annual meeting on road construction.

6. Letter from Ontario Municipal Association, asking the County to join Managers of Homes for Aged and Infirm, that the 8th annual convention will be held at Welland, June 21st, 22nd and 3rd next.

## REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

Summarized Annual Report of the Haldimand County Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture for the Fiscal Year Ending October 31st, 1926.

The work of the office has shown good progress due to the support of the County Council, County Women's Institute, Agricultural Societies, the Breeders Clubs, Junior Farmers and prominent men in Haldimand County. An increased interest has been shown in educational courses and the demonstrations conducted through the office.

The number of callers at the office has increased 134 during the last year. 3200 bulletins were distributed, and 3991 circular letters mailed. 32 meetings were addressed by the Representative with an attendance of 1647 people. Two Cow Testing Associations were organized, with 35 members and 294 hogs under test.

The Caledonia Dairy Limited very kindly re-operated in the cow testing work. 2363 sheep were dipped in the 15 community tanks situated at fairly evenly distributed points over the county. One Pure Bred Ram Club was organized at Jarvis, with 16 members; each member received a bonus of \$10 from the Dominion Live Stock Branch for the purpose of encouraging them to use pure bred rams. Five car loads of wool were shipped cooperatively by over 200 farmers, containing approximately 33000 pounds of wool. Two Bacon Hog Clubs were organized, one at Willow Grove, the other at North Seneca. At present we have eight clubs with 128 members.

The first Bacon Hog Fair was held at Nelles Corners on Oct. 12th. 239 hogs were brought to the fair. 50 hogs were purchased in the regular waf by the local drover and 149 were marketed under the rules of the fair. The Bacon Hog Fair was an outstanding success, and will do a great deal towards increasing the percentage of pure bred hogs in Haldimand County.

Seventeen flocks were culled for farmers, with a total of 2010 hens. Six demonstrations in poultry culling, killing, plucking, diseases, etc., were held, with an attendance of 93 people. 130 pullets, 65 cockerels, 1400 baby chicks and 279 dozen eggs were sold from the Poultry Breeding Station for the purpose of improving the poultry in the County.
