REPORT OF DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE (Continued from Page 1) Alfalfa Campaign, with a total attendance of 235, and 310 copies of Circular No. 40 "Hardy Alfalfa," were distributed. In addition, 116 cultures were used by farmers, 57 purchased from the O.A.C., and 59 were secured from Ottawa. As a result of the campaign, the alfalfa acreage is almost doubled. Six single men and six boys were placed directly from the office. A large number were placed in the County through the Colonization B. at Toronto. Four Fall Fairs were held in Haldimand County with a total gate receipts of \$5,376.40 and total prize money paid to farmers of \$2,455.60 and total number of entries 627. Live Stock Breeders' Clubs, such as the Caledonia Shorthorn Breeders' Club, the Haldimand District Holstein Breeders' Club and the Norfolk and Haldimand Holstein Breeders' Clubs combined, held three sales, two at Caledonia and one at Hagersville. These sales were well patronized and good prices were received for quality animals.

Seven School Fairs were held in the County, with 86 schools, 2136 pupils, 3136 plots, 3488 entries and an attendance of over 6,000. The School Fairs were very successful due to the active support of many willing and efficient existing organizations. The Championship School Fair Parade was held at Caledonia on October 7, with seven schools and 168 children taking part. The prizes were: 1st, \$25; 2nd, \$15 and 3rd, \$10. In addition J. W. Richardson Esq., donated a handsome silver cup. The drills, parades, songs, etc., were very creditably displayed by the different schools and were an added feature to the Fall Fair.

Two Home Garden Contests, with 29 boys and 21 girls, were conducted. Ten pounds of Nitrate of Soda was given each contestant free of charge by the Chilean Nitrate Committee. \$40 was distributed in cash for best kept gardens and \$18 for the best essays on the use of Nitrate of Soda in the home garden, making a total of \$58. Of this amount \$38 was donated through kindness of the Chilean Nitrate Committee. The boys and girls took great interest in Home Garden work and derived a good deal of valuable information from their experiences.

There are three Junior Farmers' Associations, with a total of 138 members and two Junior Institutes, with 72 members, in the county. The Junior Farmers and Junior Institute organizations rendered splendid assistance to the office. The County Live Stock Judging Competition was held at Caledonia, 19 young men taking part, and the prizes, 1st, 2nd and 3rd, a Free Trip to the Royal Winter Fair, and 4th, 5th and 6th, a Free Trip to the Guelph Winter Fair, were donated by the County Council. The young men winning a trip to the Royal Winter Fair were Morley Johnston, Ernest Anderson and George Lint. Those winning a free trip to the Guelph Winter Fair were Irwin Swick, Elmer Schweyher and Henry Wadsworth. At the Intra-County Competition at the Royal, Haldimand stood 13th and at Guelph Winter Fair 16th.

In the County Girls' Household Science Judging Competition, held at Cayuga, 15 contestants took part and the prizes, free trips to Toronto C.N.E. donated by the Council, were won by Elga Lint, Frances Fearman and Betty Elder. In the C.N.E. Intra-County Competition in Household Science at Toronto, Haldimand County Team won First, with 21 counties competing. Miss Betty Elder was high girl in the competition, winning 745 points out of a possible 800, and Miss Elga Lint stood second with 742 points out of a possible 800. As a result of her standing at Toronto, Miss Elga Lint was granted a trip by the County Council to the Boys' and Girls' Congress held in conjunction with the International at Chicago.

The Three Months' School of Agriculture and Home Economics at Caledonia had a total enrolment of 161 students, and an average daily attendance of 93. This was one of the most successful schools ever held in the Province. In addition to the regular routine work of the School, educational tours, special prizes, certificates of Merit and social functions all added to the interest and value of the course. Seventeen motion picture shows were screened, with a total attendance of 1655. The support of the County Council, Women's Institute, and all other organizations, as well as individuals, who contributed in any way in furthering the interests of Agriculture in Haldimand, is herewith acknowledged and greatly appreciated by the Representative.
